

McLain Rink Wins 1st Round In Gold Cup Event

 QUEBEC, Jan. 29 —(CP)—Rinks tonight advanced to the quarter-finals of the Chateau International and Omega International, thus qualifying for competition in the blue ribbon event of Quebec's 38th International Bouspiel.

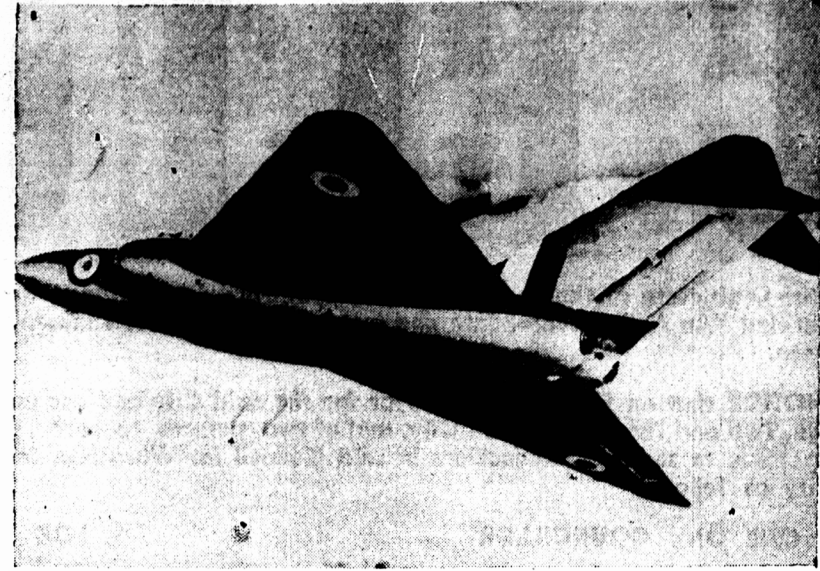

England's "Mystery Plane" Is Unveiled



Photographed for the first time in the air over London, Eng., is the Gloster GA 5, often described as "Britain's mystery plane". A member of the Hawker-Siddeley group, its unusual shape answers a vital design problem, the low aspect of the Delta wing providing minimum changes in stability and control characteristics at sonic speeds. Powered by two record-breaking Sapphire jets, the GA 5 is a radar-equipped all-weather, day and night, long-range Delta Wing fighter, claimed by the RAF to be the only fighter of its kind in existence. Although its speed, range, armament and radar gear are secret, it is reported by some experts to be better qualified than any other aircraft in the world to destroy atom bombers.
