We notice by the prize list of the closing session of Dalhousie College that Mr. Humphrey Mellish, one of our Island boys, is the most distinguished student of his year in the Law Department. Mr. Mellish stands first in the following subjects:—Constitutional Law, Contracts, Criminal Law, Real Property, and second in Law of Landlord and Tenant.

The British corvette Garnet, Captain Hand, which has been in port at Norfolk, Va., some days, on the 27th ult., dropped down to Hampton Roads, where she is now at anchor. It is said that there are two English men-of-war cruising off the Cape for the purpose, if war is declared, of intercepting the Russian ship Strypox has been receiving despatches in cipher frequently during the day, and is believed to be preparing to put to sea very soon.

The British brigantine Serotha, which arrived at St. John's, N. F., on the 29th ult., brought in Capt. Bowden and two of the crew of the brigantine Marine E., discovered perishing amid the ice floe in latitude 46 30 north, longitude 45 54 west. They had been 18 days exposed to rain, sleet and snow, without cover, and only a little bread washed about in the bottom of the boat. Their vessel sank on the 5th April, crushed in the ice, and they were rescued on the 25th. The first officer and the balance of the crew, it is supposed, sank in the longboat shortly after leaving the vessel, two screeches having been heard by the survivors shortly after the ship's company parted.

THE RUSSIAN WAR.

Reported Russian Advance Contradicted.

An English Proposal "WAS THE COVENANT BROKEN?"

LONDON, April 30. In the House of Lords this afternoon Earl Granville announced that a telegram from Sir Peter Lumsden contradicted the reports of the Russian advance upon and the occupation of Mernchak.

In the Commons this afternoon, Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice stated that the Government were as yet without information of the second engagement between the Afghans and Russian troops, and believe that the Afghans still hold Balamurhab.

Shipowners are urging upon the Government the necessity for the creation of defences upon the Clyde. They declare that as the Clyde is at present, foreign cruisers could quickly destroy its shipping.

Moscow, April 30. The Gazette says if England wishes to avoid war, she must evacuate Port Hamilton, at the entrance to the Sea of Japan, otherwise Russia will be obliged to occupy Herat.

LONDON, April 30. It is known that Earl Granville's note, besides asking for an arbitration, inquiring into the Komaroff incident, offered to end the dispute by ceding to Russia the Lassar Line, under the distinct pledge that it should be the abiding limit of the Russian frontier.

The response of M. De Giers will reach here on Monday. It will announce the acceptance of the Lassar Line, but the refusal to hold an inquiry into the Komaroff incident.

BRUSSELS, April 30. The Independent Belges, St. Petersburg correspondent reiterates the statement that there has been a fresh engagement between the Russians and Afghans, and that the former was repulsed. He asserts that the report has been officially confirmed.

LONDON, May 1. The Standard says: We are able to state upon unquestionable authority, that the English proposal to Russia is for a submission to arbitration to the crowned heads of Europe the simple question whether or not the covenant of March 7th was broken by Russia. This proposal is now under consideration by the Russian Government which has decided to convene a meeting of the Committee of Ministers at Gatschina to consider the question.

THE RIEL REBELLION!

THE CRISIS OF THE CAMPAIGN

To be Reached within Twenty-four Hours

The Rebels to be Completely Annihilated.

WINNIPEG, April 30.

Gen. Middleton, during the advance, will keep his force pretty well scattered, in order that, should an engagement be sprung suddenly, his troops may spread and endeavor to surround the enemy, and if possible capture the leaders.

Gen. Middleton has expressed himself as bound to win the next battle and completely annihilate the rebels if it costs every man under his command. The crisis of the campaign may be looked for within the next twenty-four hours.

It is expected the enemy will be encountered at Gabriel's Crossing or at Batouche. The force will then pass on to Prince Albert.

The boys are all eager to avenge the death of their comrades.

An Ottawa special says: According to latest advices in the hands of the Government, up to this morning, the Indian population in the disturbed district in the Northwest are divided as follows: Hostiles, 2,680; doubtful, 756; neutral and remaining on the reserves 1,500.

Hon. Mr. Royal, M. P., received a telegram from Archbishop Tache last night stating that he had postponed his visit to Europe owing to the Northwest troubles.

THE RUSSIAN WAR.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

CHAMBERLAIN'S SPEECH.

At a dinner of the "Eighty Club" in London, on the 29th ult., Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, said: We have met at a time overshadowed with apprehensions of a grave conflict which England has neither sought nor desired, and which, if it should occur, would be a misfortune to civilization. Therefore it is the highest obligation of a patriotic government to exhaust every means to preserve peace. It is impossible to speak on the subject when the issues of peace and war are trembling in the balance. However, the government found themselves confronted with a determined policy of aggression. That summons would be answered as in past times, and the English democracy would show itself patient, resolute, and enduring, exhibiting the courage and tenacity that formerly distinguished the Anglo-Saxons. It is a matter of regret that such questions should be delayed. We need political reforms, but we are fortunate that we have not yet arrived at the stage requiring us to abandon all hopes of a peaceful settlement.

IN FULL ADVANCE ON HERAT.

Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice announced in the House of Commons on the 29th inst., that the Government had received definite and reliable information that the Russians were now in full advance on Herat. He also announced that the report of the occupation of Maruchak had been confirmed. The announcement created a profound sensation, and much bitterness was expressed by members. A gloomy feeling prevails in London, the belief being general that the commencement of open hostilities between England and Russia is only the matter of a few days. The Duke of Cambridge inspected troops who have been ordered out on active service in case of war, at Aldershot a few days ago.

DE GIER'S RESIGNATION.

A despatch of the 30th ult., to Independence from St. Petersburg says: "After the council yesterday, at which De Giers proposed to adopt conciliatory measures toward England were rejected. De Giers tendered his resignation as foreign minister, but the Czar refused to accept it at the present crisis. On the arrival of the news of the Russian defeat at Afghanistan the Czar sent a courier despatch to England in the nature of ultimatum and signed an order for mobilization of the forces."
