## Theatre To Have Unique Features

At least 350 men will be employed by Piggot Construction Company by the end of six weeks for work on the Fathers of Confederation memorial structures being erected here it was learned yesterday from R. M. Rikard, job superintendent. At present 250 men are at work.

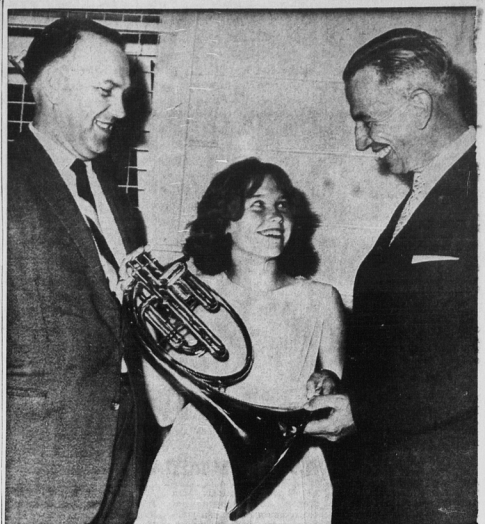
The 100 additional men will be needed as there is a great demand for experienced carpenters and, in the near future, stone masons and brick layers. Most of the men on the job now and those to be hired soon, are native Islanders.

The theatre structure is well underway and is ahead of construction on the other structures. Work will start on Monday on the roof of the theatre which will be made of concrete weighing 400 tons and will be a major task in the construction.

Several features will be included in the theatre which are unique to the island and one or two features will be first for Canada.

The walls of the auditorium are made of stone. The movie projector will be pointed in the opposite direction from conventional stages and will project to the back of the auditorium. However, mirrors will then reflect the light from the front under the floor and therefore no interference will be experienced with seating capacity.

The organ platform and the "fore stage" are mounted on hydraulic ramps so they can be lowered out of sight.

## Aussie Upsets No. 3 Favorite At Wimbledon

LONDON (Reuters)—Lanky Fred Stolle of Australia Wednesday topped fellow-countryman Ken Fletcher, the No. 3 favorite for the men's singles title, to provide the major upset of the third day of the Wimbledon tennis championships here.

Stolle won a tremendous service-governed second-round duel 75, 87, 12-15, 6-4 to reach the 1st 32 in the event.

Fletcher, Australia's second-best player behind Roy Emerson, spent three days in bed with tonsillitis last week, and the vital gap in his training on the eve of Wimbledon obviously told in a match in which stamina was almost as important as stroke play.

In other men's singles events, fourth-seeded Chuck McKinley of the U.S. beat Australia's Dylan Lane 75, 6-4, 8-6.

In the first round of the women's event, fourth-seeded Darlene Hard of the U.S. scored a 6-0, 6-0 victory against Britain's Jean Fulton.

McKinley, who heads the American challenge, had to fight all the way to overcome the unranked Australian.

In the first round, Lane, returning service splendidly, led 4-0 and came within two points of the set.

The chunky little American survived the crisis to win, though he needed three match points to do so.

There still were 21 horses entered in the 12-mile handicap. But Irish trainer Vincent O'Brien said that if the going were to be heavy, he would enter the colors of Mrs. Anne Bullitt Biddle, Ireland-based daughter of a former U.S. ambassador to Moscow and Paris.

American horses still listed among the probable starters were Biddie's Partholon and L'Homme d'Armes, Pardo, owned by Mrs. John Oller of Alton, and Galia, owned by E. E. Dale Shaffer of Miami, Fla.
