

UNDER SAD CIRCUMSTANCES

Death of John Steele at Clyde River, Yesterday

A man named John Steele, belonging to Cornwall, died at Clyde River yesterday morning under sad circumstances. It seems that Steele was in town on Friday, and on that night, on his way home stopped at the house of a friend. Here he remained until late Saturday afternoon, when he complained of being ill and said he was going to see a doctor. On the way to the doctor's he evidently became worse and lay under a bush. Here he was afterwards found vomiting and apparently very weak. He was taken to the house of a man named Archibald McDonald, where he was kept all night, sleeping on a lounge in the kitchen. On Sunday morning he asked for a drink of water which was given him. After giving him the drink Mrs. Macdonald went outside to do some work and upon her return she found Steele dead. Steele was about 55 years of age, and was a carpenter by trade. He was known to many people in Charlottetown. The facts above were this afternoon placed before Dr. Conroy, Coroner for Queen's County.

ATTEMPTED BURGLARY.—One night last week an attempt was made to burgle the post office at Sackville. The safe was drilled, but not exploded. The crooks were disturbed before they completed their work.

FESTIVAL AT GEORGETOWN.—A straw berry and ice cream festival, in aid of the organ fund of the Georgetown Baptist Church, will be held on the grounds of the Georgetown Driving Park, on the evening of Friday, July 20, beginning at 7 o'clock. ISLANDERS FROM AFRICA.—The Parisian bringing the first of the Canadians home from South Africa, arrived at Quebec at four o'clock on Saturday morning. Among them were J. Fred Wayne and Michael McCarthy, two Islanders who left here on the 25th of last October. McCarthy was invalided because of fever and Wayne was severely wounded in the Paardeberg fight. The returned soldiers were to have left Quebec last night, and if they came straight through the Islanders would be due here to-night. But up to the time of writing (two o'clock) no further information regarding their home-coming was at hand.

DATE CANCELLED.—Theatre-goers will regret to learn that Mr. Jepson, manager of "The Wooing of Mrs. Van Cott," has been compelled to cancel his engagement for the 20th inst., at the Opera House. On account of the change of time made by the I. C. R. and Steam Navigation Company he will not be able to make connection with Charlottetown. Frank L. Bisby, the genial representative of the above company, has been here since Friday endeavoring to secure a special steamer to bring the company to Charlottetown, but has not been able to do so.

THE NEW BRIDGE.—Work up on the new stone bridge at Brighton will begin this week. This bridge will be constructed according to plans made by Mr. J. P. Nicholson, C. E., City Surveyor. The bridge will be 48 feet long and 8 feet high. It will be finished at both ends with steps from the roadbed to the water line. The ends will be finished with heavy copings, 48 inches wide, which will serve for sidewalks. These copings will be protected by ornamental iron railings, which will extend along the approaches at each side of the bridge. The entire roadbed will be covered with nine inches of macadam metal.
