## Sensational Duel Set For Tonight

Another sensational race card has been lined up for the Charlottetown Driving Park this Saturday night. It's speed you're looking for, you've got the right place as race classifier Frank "Duck" Acorn has three double dash events which should produce miles anywhere from 2.07 to 2.10.

The featured Free-for-All goes in dashes 6 and 9 with seven speedy sidewheelers waiting for the word. The roan mare Rose Robin has drawn the rail position, the exciting Hurrah will leave from the two spot, Yankee Timber who won his last two starts here will start from the three spot, the James "Roach" MacGregor driven Shotgun Hanover will leave from the four spot, Ohio Orphan will leave from the tough number five spot, the slick pacing mare Donaway has drawn the outside six spot, and the Mrs. Francis Breaux driving Landy with Joe Arsenault driving will trail out Rose Robin.

Six more speedsters will start in another fast class which goes in dashes 7 and 10. The Emmett Bernard driven Yankee Blaze, a full brother to the Yankee Timber, will leave on the rail, the Dave Wisener driven J. Scotch Hal will score two, the smooth pacing mare Lee's Way C. will leave from the number three spot, the fast breaking Splurge will race from the four spot, the exciting Adios Forever will score five and the chestnut pacer Hi Jay driven by John "Buddy" Campbell will score six.

Dashes 5 and 8 have eight starters and each one is capable of walking off with top honors. Ozark Pete, who upset a classy field in the time of 2:09.3 and paid \$50.80 to win in his last start here, has drawn the rail position and he will be tough to beat. The fine pacing mare Countess Alice who won a heat her last start will leave two, the fast breaking High Price will score three, the chestnut mare Chum will leave from the four spot, the Ralph MacFadyen driven Elmer C. will start from the five spot, Sunny King will leave from the six spot, the great Island bred pacer Armond's Buddy will trail out Ozark Pete, and the Stanley Mayhew owned Jazzman, who was second in 2:05.3 in his last start at Brunswick Downs, will trail out Countess Alice.

Four other single dash events each packing plenty of speed round out the sensational card. Post time is 8 p.m.

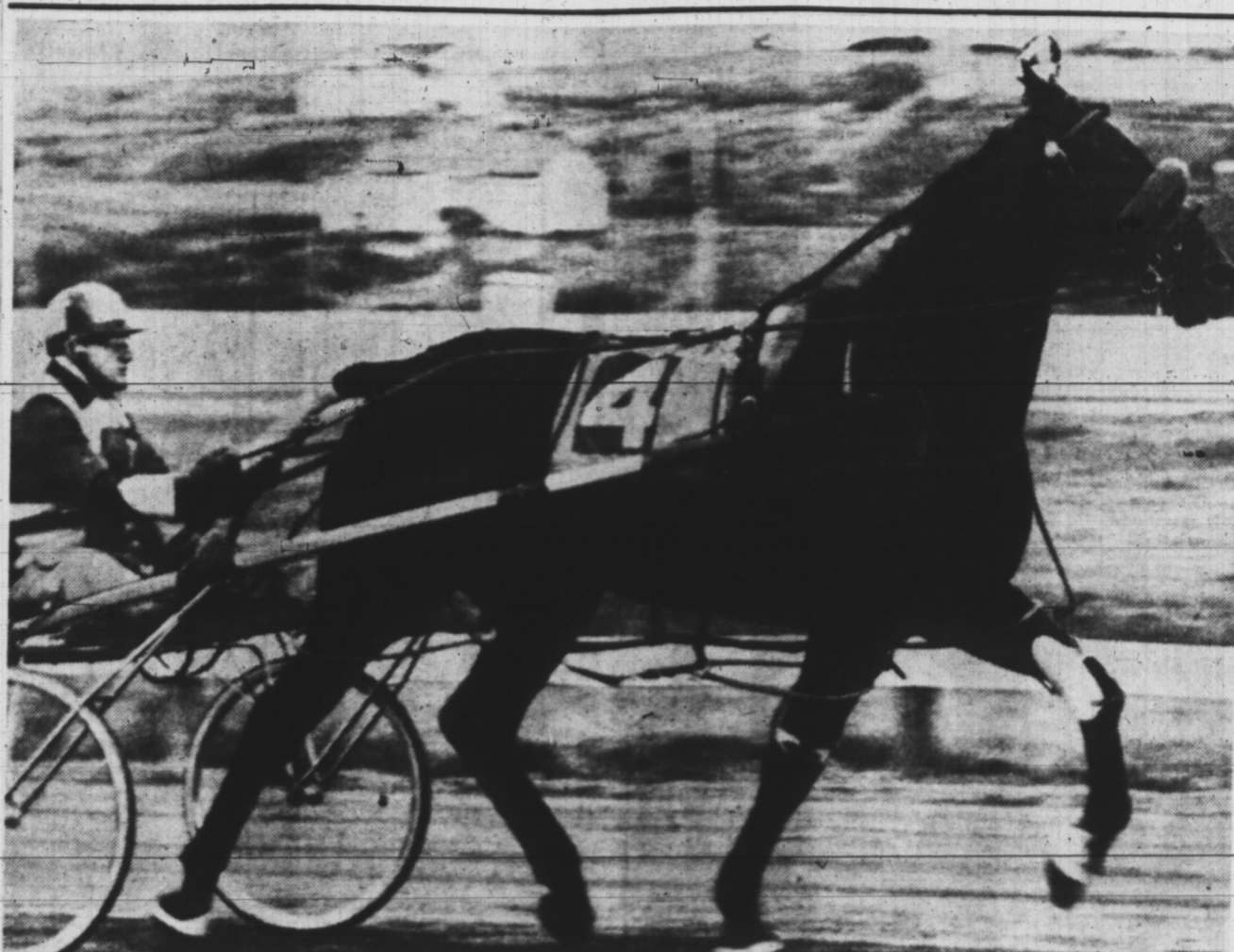

### 4 TRACKSTERS SUSPENDED

TORONTO (CP)—Lloyd Percival, whose career as a track and field coach may have been scuttled by allegations that he administered drugs to amateur athletes, returned to Toronto angry and in fighting form Friday.

"I am meeting with my lawyers (today) and have instructed them to work for a complete vindication — whatever that means," Percival, 50, said.

He was in New York when the registration committee of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada announced the suspension of three athletes and a coach Thursday and made the decision that may stop Percival from coaching amateurs again.

Without mentioning his name, the committee said the Don Mills Track Club, where Percival has been coach for nine years, may not use a professional coach again.

"The Don Mills Track Club received a telegram today (Friday) telling them to get rid of their professional coach," Mr. Percival said. "But they're going to be surprised when they discuss it because they won't be able to find a professional coach."

"NEVER TOOK CENT"  
"I never took a cent for being their coach; it was just a hobby."

Under AAU rules track clubs must receive special permission to use a professional coach. The AAU classes Percival as a professional.

Two-week suspensions were imposed on Bob Meldrum, coach of the Toronto Tiserettes, and athletes Nancy McCredie on Brampton, Susan Nigh of Markham and Peter Boag of Toronto.

Percival, who has denied the charges, said: "This I leave to the public to judge for themselves. ## Titled Hero Is Favored In Queens Plate Today

TORONTO (CP)—Ten horses take a run at beating Titled Hero in today's running of the Queen's Plate. But the black colt owned by Peter Marshall of Toronto has everything going for him.

He is a 2.5 favorite to win the 1-1/8 mile classic for Canadian three-year-olds. Only Northern Dancer, winner of the 1964 Queen's Plate, Kentucky Derby and Preakness, went into plate day with a shorter price on his nose—1 to 9.

Titled Hero is trained by Pat McMurchy, who saddled a Queen's Plate winner in Blue Light in 1961. Blue Light was

owned by the late K. R. Marshall of Toronto, father of Titled Hero's owner.

Aboard Titled Hero will be Cuban-born Avelino Gomez, one of the hottest jockeys to appear on Ontario tracks. Gomez, ranked among the top 10 riders in North America, with more than 3,000 victories, will go after his third plate triumph in the race, scheduled to start at 5:12 p.m. and carried on CBC television and radio.

Only five jockeys have ridden three plate winners—R. O'Leary in 1872, 1880 and 1889; D. Lewis in 1896, 1897 and 1900; Frank Mann in 1931, 1932 and 1934; Bobby Watson in 1941, 1944 and 1945 and Chris Rogers in 1949, 1950 and 1954.

Gomez, top rider in Canada in 1964, was aboard Plate winner Victoria Park in 1960 and Lyford Cay in 1957. Both horses were owned by Toronto industrialist E. P. Taylor.

**HAS CHOICE SPOT**  
Titled Hero will have the benefit of the No. 5 post position, considered a choice starting point. It was drawn for him Thursday. A clear, warm day is forecast and attendance could reach 30,000.

The betting handle is expected to top \$1,000,000 for the day. Last year's handle—\$1,398,342—is a record for Woodbine racetrack on the northern outskirts of Metropolitan Toronto.

The race will have a record purse of \$80,175, surpassing the 1963 high of \$80,009. Value to the winner is \$52,113.75, short of the 1963 record of \$54,850 collected by Canebor, another Taylor-owned horse. The second-place finisher will collect \$15,035, third place is worth \$8,017.50 and fourth place \$4,008.75.

### HUNTERS' CORNER

#### Local Black Duck Hatch Is Now Causing Concern

The local black duck hatch is causing concern at the moment. The few broods reported to date are large—one in the eleven bracket—but they are few and far between. In an area where five or six broods of blacks would be present in former years, this columnist is only positive of one and this is not a 'right' count.

I overheard a mother black in a dense flag growth giving the low chatter that indicates she has a family in tow. A few years ago there would be a minimum of six in this breeding ground. It looks at the moment as if our local black duck population is teetering on the verge of zero.

Trout fishermen are reporting that the hatch is in the evening dusk and on Sunday afternoon's. One such 'barrage' was reported on Sunday, the 18th, at the Cardigan Causway. It was no hit and run affair but continued for an approximate two hours. Sunday 'sniping' has also been reported by anglers in the Savage Harbour sector. One alibi for the Sunday shooting was that the boys were getting in some practice shots on crows despite the fact that Sunday shooting is unlawful in any capacity.

A lot of trout have been taken this season in the four and five pound bracket in the West River and Cardigan River and some have been hooked that just headed for the wide open spaces. One angler stated he had an approximate three hundred feet of nylon line on a top spinning reel and on his first cast at his favorite spot on the West River he hooked into something that headed up river like a jet propelled speed boat. He might as well have been hooked into the tail of a rampaging steer because it just kept on going until the line ran out. It broke at the cast and he figured he was lucky for such a line comes expensive. There are a number of seals in the West River and he thought at first, by the heavy under water swirl, that a seal had got hooked accidentally—but it was no seal.

There are steel heads in the Cardigan River that no angler but to all appearances, they are well ahead of any previous date this year.

It is quite apparent that trout fishermen, at least 20 per cent of them, pay no more attention to daily bag limits of twenty trout than if it didn't exist and had been scratched off the Special Fishery Regulations. I have been told of some trout fishermen who have taken sixty odd trout in a single day, and none under the quarter pound mark and were back the next day and again the next trying for the last one.

I have talked to enforcement officers and they have become discouraged over the penalties imposed and in some instances no penalty at all. As one conscientious officer remarked: "Will I ever be glad when the first of July is past? I asked him what he was doing to put in the time and his reply was not unexpected. "Sitting in a comfortable chair and twiddling my thumbs most of the time, and doing what paper work comes my way." Maybe he is smart at that. Non observance of game law and fisher regulations at the moment has passed all previous records for those who take pleasure in the wide open spaces and the fee of a shotgun across one's arm or the simple dash of a trout trouting rod. The end could be nearer than we think.

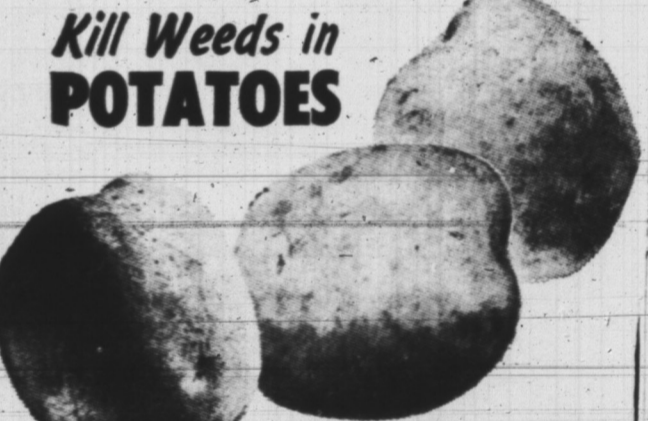

## Bernard Begins Twentieth Year

Emmett "Cowboy" Bernard, the tough likeable veteran driver, has begun his second decade in the maritime harness racing game this spring and after twenty years is going stronger than ever.

Emmett Bernard was born on his father's farm on April 26, 1916, and from that time until his early teens was a hard-working, tough country boy. His father not only taught him how to farm but he also showed him the ways of the horse.

When Emmett was 28 his father gave him his first horse and that was the beginning of a long and colorful career. Emmett worked with his horse and in the summer of 1946 he drove her at Covehead in his first start. Land race fans might remember the horse, her name was Mary Wick.

Emmett learned plenty in his first year and by the time the spring rolled around he was driving a stable of his own which included a trotter named Lee Brewer, and a pacer named Rubin Lee.

Bernard drove to win every dash and in only his second year, driving at the track record at St. Peter's with the trotter Lee Brewer.

A man with twenty years in any field would certainly have a few memorable events and the "Cowboy" is no exception.

The tough campaigner's eyes gazed into the sky, searching for an answer to "the best horse he ever drove". "Last summer, the night I won in 2:06.3 with Jack Brown's Yankee Timber", the stocky driver answered. Emmett looked at the stalls in one section of his barn and etched in blue lettering on one stall was the name Stalg Hanover. "I've had many wins with him", he recalled. "I would say he was the second best."

Helping Emmett in no small way are caretakers Wendell Ford and Earl Smith who work almost as hard as Emmett in getting the horses in top racing form. Emmett certainly can use the help as it would be utterly impossible to both train and drive his stable of sixteen horses.

They include Stalg Hanover, Garth's Best, Mark-Purdue, Audrey's Pride, Countess, Alice Annan Gal, Velvet Chief, Terry's Chief, Cabot Straight, Yankee Blaze, Norah Annway, Little Mark, Photo Chief, Enterprise Lady, Concept and Mr. Chatterer whom he trains for Bill Henderson.

Emmett's only son, Albert, who drove here a few years ago, is now working in Hamilton, Ontario but plans to return home in a few weeks for his holidays to work with his father. Albert too well know that when he returns his holidays are over.
