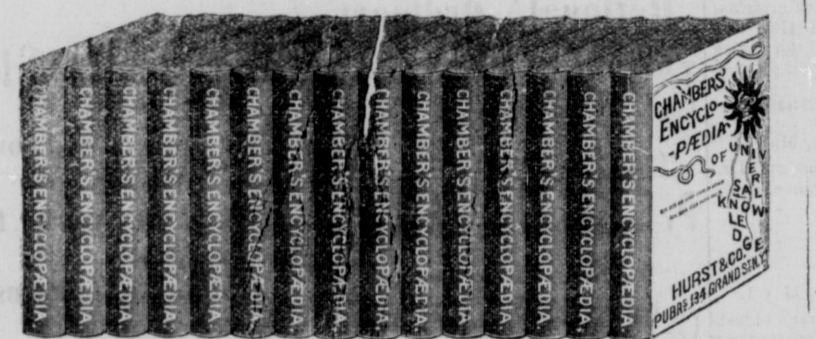

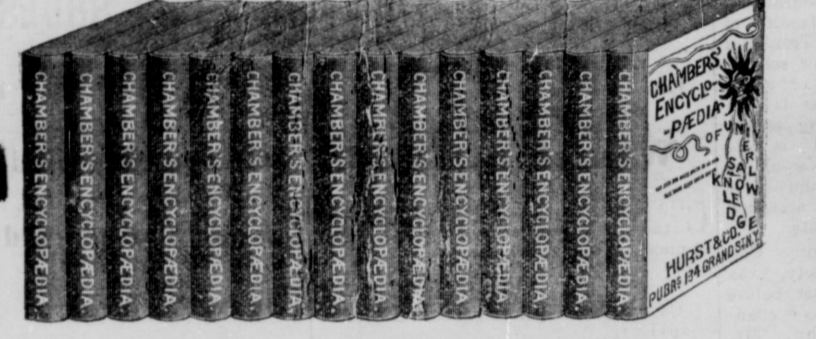

ALCOHOL AND THE HEART.
 Dr. B. W. Richardson said that he was enabled to preach an effective sermon on the subject of "Alcohol and the Heart" by means of a scientific experiment. In an acquaintance was drinking wine, and declared that he could not get the day without it.
 "Will you be good enough to feel my pulse as I stand before you?" asked Dr. Richardson.
 The man did so. "What does it say?"
 "Count it carefully."
 "Seventy-four."
 The physician then went and laid down on a sofa, and asked the gentleman to count his pulse again.
 "It has gone down to sixty-four," he said in astonishment. "What an extraordinary thing!"
 "When you lie down at night," said the physician, "that is the way nature takes to give your heart rest. You know nothing about it, but the organ rests up to that extent; and if you reckon the rate, it involves a good deal of rest, because in lying down the heart is doing ten strokes less a minute."
 "Multiply that by sixty, and it is six hundred; multiply it by eight hours, and with a fraction, there is a difference of five thousand strokes; and as the heart is throwing six ounces of blood at every stroke, it makes a difference of thirty thousand ounces of life during the night. When I lie down at night without an alcohol, that is the rest my heart gets."
 "But when I take wine or grog, I do not allow that rest, but the number of strokes is increased. Instead of getting repose, the man that uses alcohol put on something like fifty thousand extra strokes, and he rises quite unfit for the next day's work until he has taken a little more of that 'ruddy bumper,' which he calls 'the soul of man below.'"

Hope for the Drunkard.
 In a recent article entitled "Hope for the Drunkard," the New York Observer says:—
 A man may have ceased to realize the power of an old appetite. He may even have forgotten the very taste of the thing that once he loved, and yet he is safe only as he trusts a stronger power than his own. He is on a terrible treacherous ground when he declares it impossible for him to be again enslaved.
 We regret a tendency manifested in some quarters to treat drunkenness as a disease merely. It is a sin. Undoubtedly a disease remedy can be found or has been found for the disease, we should be glad to see it thoroughly tested. But the details of the treatment should invariably be made sufficiently public to prevent any appearance of trickery. And since it is a sin, men should be taught to seek divine forgiveness for the same and to implore divine power to resist the temptation. We have seen numbers of drunkards hopefully reformed. We have rejoiced in the continued stand of very many. Those who have lived the happiest lives since their bonds were loosed, are those who have walked softly with their God, realizing the horrible nature of the pit from which they have been lifted and that nothing but the constant dependence on God can keep them from falling again therein. Such men have not only been kept themselves, but they have been useful in leading others out of bondage into liberty, even the liberty of the children of God.

When a fatal panic occurred a few evenings ago in the church of Torre Annunziata at Naples. During the services, which were attended by a very large number of persons, part of the draperies about the altar was blown against a lighted candle. The flames spread with great rapidity and the congregation made a mad rush for the doors. The wildest excitement prevailed, and women and children were thrown to the floor and trampled upon. The fire was quickly extinguished, and when some semblance of order was restored it was found that eight women and five children had been crushed to death, while hundreds of others had been more or less seriously injured.

General Telegraphic News.
GUTHRIE, O. T., April 27.—The list of fatalities by the cyclone on Tuesday night grows larger each hour. The list of dead still surely aggregates a hundred, and the injured five times that number.
ST. JOHN, N. F., April 27.—Rev. L. G. Stevens, wife and family have packed up and gone to the United States, where they will reside in future.
ST. JOHN'S, N. F., April 27.—The Imperial government accepts the compromise suggested by our legislature for the settlement of the French shore question. They won't re-enact last year's coercion bill in the Imperial parliament, but request our legislature to extend the temporary local act of 1891 for the purpose of giving time to negotiate. This result is eminently satisfactory to our people generally, and highly creditable to the opposition delegates, Monroe and Morine, whose determined fight, assisted by the Bond faction of the government party, prevented the destruction of the whole liberties of Newfoundland. This is a clean knock down for Whiteway and Harvey and their hopes of future preferment.
RALEIGH, N. C., April 27.—The state guard of North Carolina is holding itself in readiness to go to James City, N. C., to expel 3,000 negroes from that settlement. The negroes are not the lawful owners of the property, and it has been decided by court that they shall evacuate. They refuse to do so, and therefore bloodshed if an attempt is made to dislodge them. Military orders have been issued for the first regiment of state guards to report here to-day to proceed to James City.
WARSAW, Ind., April 27.—At Wolf Lake, on Tuesday, Theophilus Pendleton, while drunk struck his wife in the temple, killing her instantly. He seized his infant child from the cradle and pounded his head to jelly on the stove, then set fire to his dwelling and cut his throat with a razor.
CHICAGO, April 27.—Sunday opening of the World's Fair came up in to-day's meeting of the National commission. A resolution looking to that end was introduced by Commissioner King, of Iowa, and after much debate referred to the judiciary committee. The members of this committee are opposed to Sunday opening, and this, it is thought, ends the matter.
