HEADQUARTERS AT HALIFAX.—It is announced that the Armour Packing Company, of Chicago, are going to establish headquarters at Halifax.

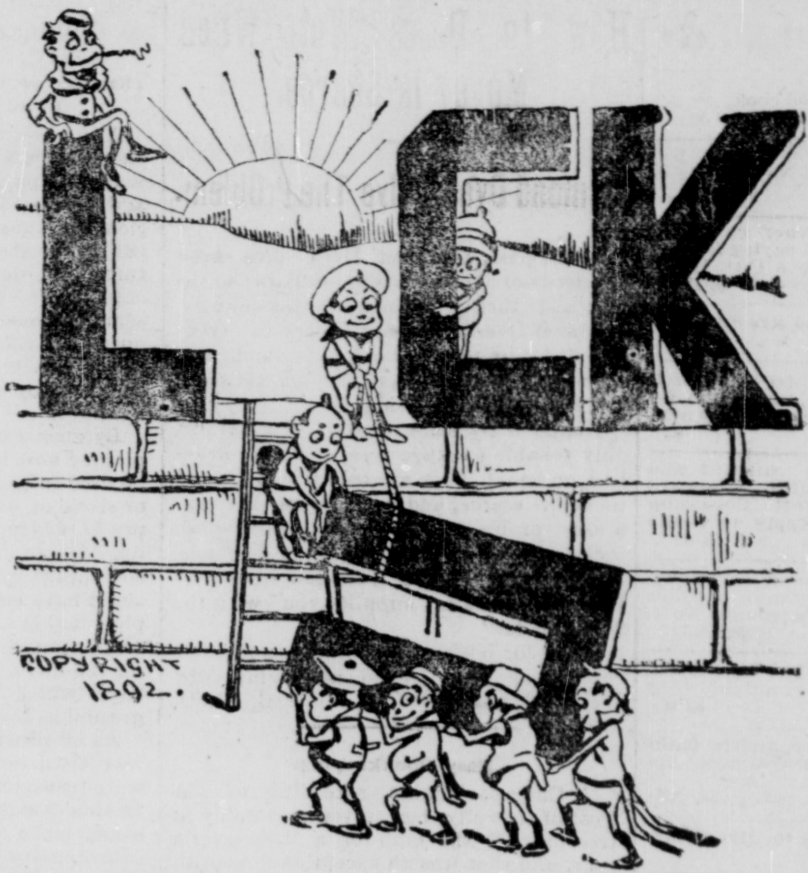
