Two 15-year-old Charlottetown Boy Scouts will skipper the posts representing Prince Edward Island in the National Boy Scout Regatta scheduled for Charlottetown August 8-15.

John Rankin, with crew David Scott came out on top of the provincial boy scout sail-off held at the Charlottetown Yacht Club Saturday with 19 1/2 points on the strength of a third and two firsts in the three race series.

Percy Simmons, with David Hume in the crew slot, placed second with 19 1/2 points, one quarter of Rankin's pace. He

WESTFIELD, N.B. (CP) — Doug MacAfee of Sussex, N.B., added the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island junior championship to two other big wins this year as he carded a record 24 for 24 holes over the weekend at the Westfield Golf and Country Club.

A member of the two-province Willington Cup team, by virtue of top spot in the sectional playoff, the 17-year-old MacAfee now has a berth on the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island junior team. Earlier, he won the Riverside Invitational.

Placing fourth in the competition was Bill Simmons and fifth was Peter Williams. Three scout crews from Summerside made up the total of eight boats entered.

The first races in the Boy Scout National will get under way on Tuesday, August 11 and will terminate Friday, August 14. Crews from all provinces in Canada except Saskatchewan are entered as well as one crew from the U.S. and two from England.

Harvey Fires Brilliant 71

CALGARY (CP) — Gail Harvey of Toronto provided a golf lesson for nearly 500 spectators Saturday as she recorded a closing - round 71 to win the Canadian Women's Close golf championship by six strokes over Betty Stanhope Cole.

Miss Harvey, who won the Canadian junior championship in 1958, 1959 and 1960, used her 84-hole total of 215 - four under women's par - to exact revenge against Marlene Stewart of Toronto.

Miss Harvey, 30, lost to Mrs. Street by one stroke in the close competition last year. She also lost to Mrs. Street in the Canada women's open, a March play competition, and will attempt to make up for that defeat Tuesday.

BECAME DRIFTER

The three race series, sailed over a two and a half mile Gold Cup course started with one race in the morning which turned into a drifter when the wind failed to strengthen and Simmons placed first over Stewart with a two minute lead.

During the second race, which was started in the afternoon, Rankin dominated the sailing with an ideal sailing breeze to take a minute and 15 second lead over Simmons, and during the third race, the wind increased to around 15 mph and Rankin walked into a three and a half minute gap at the finish line.

IN THIRD PLACE

The 228 total by Miss Post, 16-year-old Ontario amateur champion, left her third in the individual class behind Mrs. Cole, who totalled 221. Fourth was Joanne Goulet of Regina with 220. Mrs. Street, who won the close competition seven times previously, ended with 231 after a sharp 74 Saturday.

Behind the leaders, a spectacular battle is brewing for the third and final spot on the Canadian team to compete in October in the women's world cup matches at Paris.

Fourth round of the 72-hole qualifying test will also be the qualifying round of the open. In the running for the open are Mrs. W. Turnbull of Saskatoon, Miss Galusha, Mary Gay of Kitchener, Ont., Gayle Hichens of Vancouver and Barbara Renwick of Vancouver.

All remained under 240, leaving a gap of only nine shots behind Miss Goulet.

LARGE CROWD

Old Hat Captures Top Money Race

NEW YORK (AP)—A five-year-old bay mare named Old Hat upset the experts' prediction Saturday by capturing the world's richest race for fillies and mares—the \$25,000 Delmar Handicap at Stanton, Delaware Park.

The 1 1/2-length victory was scored at the direct expense of Harry S. Nichols' favored Miss Ovidish, the only three-year-old in the field and with three stakes triumphs against rivals.

Thomas "White" Waltz Song, last year's surprise winner, was third in the field of 12.

Old Hat earned \$79,254.50 and the Delmar Handicap Gold Cup for her owner, Stanley Cole of Prospect, Ky.

Old Hat, ridden by Buck Thornburg and carrying the light weight of 113 pounds, paid \$38, \$10.20 and \$6.20. Miss Cavendish returned \$4 and \$3 and Waltz Song \$11.60. The time for the race was 2:04.

At Oceanport, N.J., Bold Express, a daughter of Bold Ruler, captured the \$100,000 Meadow Stale, snapped Queens' string of victories at the track and won the \$100,000 stakes for two-year-old fillies at Monmouth Park in record time.

ROOTS HIM HOME

Jockey Bob Usery sent Bold Express to the fore in the three-year-old stakes and won the race by a mile in 1:09.35 to cut two-fifths of a second off the stakes record hung up by Affectionately in 1962.

The winner, earning \$90,000 to boost her bank account to \$120,940, paid \$2.20, \$1 and \$2.40. Queens Express paid \$2.20 as she.

At New York, Lough Aloud closed with a rush in the final 1/16th of a mile for a two-length decision in the \$29,450 Lexington Handicap at Aqueduct.

Under jockey Ron Turcotte's whip, Lough Aloud caught the leaders at the 16th pole and was going away in 1:43 for the 1 1/8-mile event. Turcotte is from Grand Falls, N.S.

Gun Boat, who set the pace until collared by Lough Aloud, held on for second 1/4 length in front of National.

Lough Aloud, owned by H. E. Knight, was trained by J. J. McCarthy, St. Peters Road.
