Nfld. Federal Civil Servants Lose Appeal

OTTAWA (CP) — Hopes of 700 employees at Newfoundland's Gander Airport for a total \$2,500,000 in back pay were dashed Tuesday when the Supreme Court of Canada threw out an action by Chesley Samson for \$3,468 from the federal transport department.

Mr. Samson's action was a case, in which he alleged that under the terms of Newfoundland's 1949 entry in Confederation federal employee's hours and rates of pay were to conform with those in effect for similar services in other parts of Canada. He said his pay was less and his work longer than prevailed at Montreal's Dorval Airport.

The transport department's argument was that the wages were at rates recommended by the federal labor department which set scales that vary throughout the country, local conditions being taken into consideration.

The Supreme Court assessed costs against Mr. Samson but said there would be none to the attorney-general of Newfoundland and Canada who intervened in the case.

KIEL, Germany (Reuters) — The West German navy's second U-boat went into service Tuesday with a crew of 17 Second World War veterans. The U-boat was reconditioned after being raised last spring from the Baltic where she had rested since the end of the war.

Baptist Council Will Be Held In Edmonton

The thirty-two member Council of the Baptist Federation of Canada will hold its annual meeting at Edmonton, Alberta, October 19-23, in the First Baptist Church of that city. Presided over by the Federation President, Dr. C. Howard Bentall of Walmer Road Baptist Church, Toronto, the Council membership represents the Maritime United Baptist Convention, the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, the Baptist Union of Western Canada. Included in the three constituent Conventions are some 1200 churches and 140,000 members.

The Council functions as the directive body of the Federation in the years between the Triennial Assemblies of the body, the next of which will meet at Queens University, Kingston, Ontario, in June, 1959. Many matters of Canada-wide Baptist concern will engage the attention of the Edmonton sessions of the Council. A new Canada-wide Ministerial Superannuation plan will be studied. Relations with the Southern Baptist Convention as these affect Southern Baptist activity in Canada, will be discussed, with several Southern Baptist leaders present for the conference.

Plans will be furthered for the Baptist Jubilee Advance, 1959-1964 in which Canadian Baptists will co-operate with six large American Baptist bodies in a joint program of Baptist advance in the fields of evangelism, stewardship, Christian Education, missions, Baptist witness, Church extension. Eighteen committees will report on past activity and plans for the immediate future. Many other matters of significance will be on the agenda.

OTTAWA (CP)—Larger working forces and fatter payrolls boosted Canada's industrial employment and payroll indexes to record highs Aug. 1, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday. The industrial employment index, computed on the basis of 1949 figures equalling 100, rose to 127.5 at Aug. 1, from 126.6 July 1 and from 125.4 a year earlier.
