The choice of Mrs. Lawson was made at a meeting of the Caledonian Club held last night. Mrs. Lawson, the former Doris Anderson, is a top ranking Highland dancer. She is a former junior champion of Northern Scotland and placed third for the whole of Scotland in competitions run off at Glasgow at which five members of the Scottish Dancing Teachers Association were the judges.

"Prince of Wales College is an institution of which any province or city might well be proud," Dr. W. F. Freival, Deputy Minister of Education, Province of Quebec said in his opening remarks at addressing the Rotary Club at their luncheon meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.
