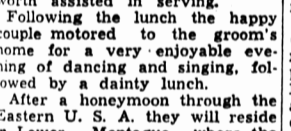

WASHINGTON (AP) - A San Francisco doctor said Monday mass x-ray is the best available method for spotting lung cancer in the general population but it is far from good enough. "If a significant attack is to be made on the lung cancer problem," a more effective method of detection on a mass basis among apparently healthy people will have to be found, said Dr. L. Henry Garland, himself an x-ray specialist. The doctor suggested that research be pushed to develop some "biochemical" or other method - possibly including some kind of blood test - as a means of detecting lung cancer on a more sure-fire basis among the general public. SEVERAL DRAWBACKS - Garland, in a report prepared for the 55th annual meeting of the American Roentgen Ray Society opening today, said recent surveys in several large cities showed mass x-rays had several drawbacks, including: 1. Mass x-ray detects only about 10 cases of lung cancer in every 100,000 persons of all ages examined, compared with an estimated prevalence rate of 18 per 100,000. 2. Lung cancer detected in mass

declared that chest x-ray is the best available method for spotting lung cancer in the general population but it is far from good enough. "If a significant attack is to be made on the lung cancer problem," a more effective method of detection on a mass basis among apparently healthy people will have to be found, said Dr. L. Henry Garland, himself an x-ray specialist. The doctor suggested that research be pushed to develop some "biochemical" or other method - possibly including some kind of blood test - as a means of detecting lung cancer on a more sure-fire basis among the general public. SEVERAL DRAWBACKS - Garland, in a report prepared for the 55th annual meeting of the American Roentgen Ray Society opening today, said recent surveys in several large cities showed mass x-rays had several drawbacks, including: 1. Mass x-ray detects only about 10 cases of lung cancer in every 100,000 persons of all ages examined, compared with an estimated prevalence rate of 18 per 100,000. 2. Lung cancer detected in mass

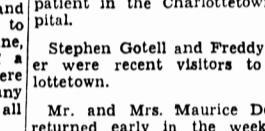
