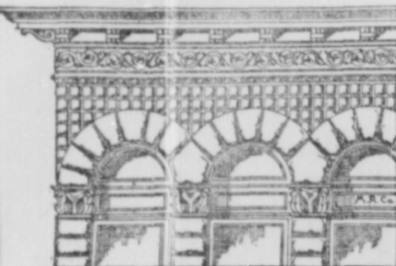

Transvaal Reforms.

CAPE TOWN, July 11.—The Hon. W. P. Schreiner, Prime Minister of Cape Colony, says the Cape Government regards the Transvaal's reform proposals as adequate and calculated to insure a peaceful settlement. The colonial Premier, however, represents the Afrikaner element. Sir John Gordon Sprigg, former Prime Minister and Colonial Secretary, who is an ardent Imperialist, considers them totally inadequate to meet the just claims of the Uitlander, and altogether less than Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of the Colony, and British High Commissioner for South Africa, demanded of President Kruger at the Bloemfontein conference.

Rich Spaniards Fleeing.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 11.—Spaniards formerly in business in Havana and other Cuban cities, are now arriving here looking for investments and say that by October fully \$150,000,000 of Spanish capital will have been withdrawn from the Island, for Spaniards of wealth do not want to risk a long period of political unrest and possible coming into power of professional Cuban politicians. This wealth which is being taken away by Spaniards, is good cash and will mainly be taken to Spain for investment, while some will come to Mexico. Spanish merchants and planters now here report the English as being the boldest investors now in Cuba and declare the Americans are timid and have lost many large businesses which have fallen into English hands.

Tea Trade Distributed.

LONDON, July 12.—There is great excitement in the tea trade owing to the decision of the Indian and Ceylon sellers to abolish the practice of allowing a pound extra in every hundred as compensation for waste. The dealers in London are in arms and have resolved to boycott the Indian and Ceylonese teas. As a counter blast to this is the decision of the sellers of Calcutta, yesterday, who withdrew all their teas exclusively to sell for London. Twenty thousand chests were withdrawn at Calcutta alone and the auction was stopped. Out of 240,000,000 pounds required for Great Britain, planters and exporters representing 215,000,000 have promised to stick to the abolition resolutions. Some of the planters are starting for England to open agencies in this country for the sale of the teas. In the meantime the doors have been opened for China teas of a lower grade.

Out Down and Revived.

ALMA, Kan., July 10.—Dick Williams, a negro, charged with the murder of two white men, was hanged here yesterday forenoon by a mob of white men. The mob left the negro hanging to a telegraph pole and six minutes later he was cut down by the town marshal, and taken back to the county jail, where he recovered consciousness.
