Montague Curling Rink Expects Banner Season

Although not possessing an artificial ice plant, Montague, has made its mark in provincial curling circles. Members of the Montague Curling Club, formed in 1927, are looking forward to another banner season.

It was in 1936 that the club made a clean sweep of major events winning the MacArthur, Gaboury and British Consols Trophies. The victorious rink in the first British Consols Trophy competition was composed of A. Yonker, 1st stone, E. W. Beck, 2nd stone, C. K. Wightman, 3rd, and J. A. MacIntyre, skip.

Located on the north side of the Skating Rink, the first rink was a one sheet ice surface building attached to the main building. It served its purpose well and Montague has always been represented by rinks of high standing in the various Provincial Curling events.

In the late thirties the membership of the Club greatly increased and outgrew the cramped quarters. A new building was the answer and in March 1944 with the help of the Community Welfare League it was decided to build on the Legion grounds.

The rink today, a wooden structure, has a two-sheet ice surface, but was originally designed for three should a further increase in membership justify it. In 1945 the Ladies Auxiliary of the hospital added a large kitchen to the premises and Montague boasts a club par excellence where hospitality is the keynote to all visiting rinks.
