Wishful Thinking

President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles and various other Western leaders have intimated from time to time that they expect an ultimate rupture between Communist China and the Soviet Union.

It is presumed that the Soviet Union would be averse to China's becoming a dominating power in Asia, because that would diminish its own influence in Asian political and economic affairs.

This sounds reasonable enough; but whether it is, in fact, a practical consideration on which to base any part of the West's foreign policy is open to grave doubt.

Mr. Stevenson, titular head of the Democratic Party in the U.S.A., who recently toured a large part of the Soviet Union and held discussions with several of its leaders, thinks it is wishful thinking and nothing more.

Mr. Stevenson thinks, too, that "hope should be mixed with caution in expecting eruption in Soviet bloc states." No doubt, there are many people in Eastern Europe, millions of them, who would like nothing better than to rise against their oppressors.

The President of Tunisia says he is "pro-Western" and does not care who knows it. It was high time somebody stood up to Colonel Nasser of the United Arab Republic.

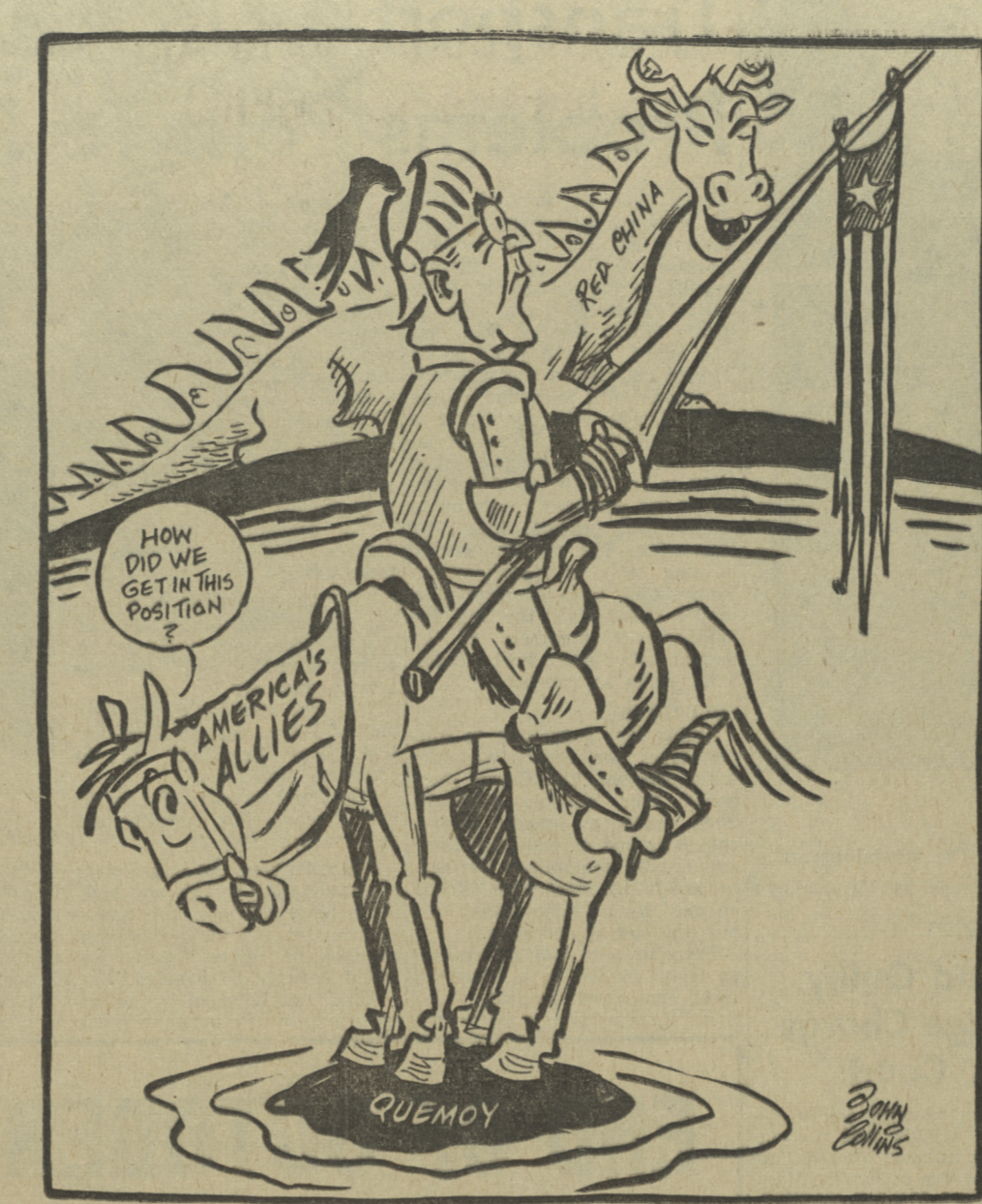

(From The Guardian Files) TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO (Oct. 28, 1933) Negotiations under way for some time have been completed between the Provincial Government and the trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital for lease to the Government of the old P.E.I. Hospital buildings on the Kensington Road, to be used to permanently relieve the situation caused by the Falconwood fire.

Arriving from Greenwood, N.S. yesterday afternoon, Col. Basil B. Campbell, assistant Deputy Defence Minister, and party of Ottawa officials and R.C.A.F. senior officers stayed at the Charlottetown last night on their way to Summerside this morning. The party is visiting all stations across Canada, the purpose being to familiarize members of various departments with local conditions in the field.
