A DYNAMITE OUTRAGE.—On Tuesday night last, says a Belleville, Ont., despatch, the dwelling of Mr. McIntyre, Miller, at Downey's Rapids, was badly shattered by an explosion under it of a dynamite cartridge, which was fired by an unknown person, who was seen to fly from the vicinity. The inmates, who consisted of Mr. McIntyre, his wife and their seven children were all injured and a large part of the building was blown to fragments.

"Absent Without Leave."

HALIFAX, April 13.

Rumors were afloat yesterday to the effect that a bank official well-known in this city had decamped with money from the People's Bank. On enquiry at the bank in question the Cashier admitted that J. McD. Crocker, the Bank's agent at Edmonton, N. B., was "absent without leave," and that the London Guarantee Company had obtained a warrant for his arrest. An examination will be made of the books at once in order to find out the amount of the defalcation. Detective Power, representing the Guarantee Co., has left for Edmonton, N. B., to apprehend, if possible, the defaulter.

The Sawtelle Murder.

BOSTON, April 13.

The Globe this morning publishes a confession of Isaac Sawtelle's. He says that he, Mrs. Hiram Sawtelle, Dr. Blood and an ex convict known as Jack, were in the conspiracy to hold Hiram a prisoner until he signed all his father's property over to Isaac. The confession says Isaac did not want him to be killed. He delivered Hiram to Jack, and he thinks Jack killed him.
