

# Hennessey Astonished By Rise In Defence Command

OTTAWA (CP)—Commodore Ralph Hennessey, fast-rising man in the Canadian defence hierarchy, is as surprised as anyone by his sudden entrance into the Ottawa spotlight.

"I don't know when I've ever been more surprised in my life," the 47-year-old officer said Thursday of his vault to the rank of vice-admiral and to the post of commander-in-chief at Canadian Forces Headquarters.

He said he knows of no precedent for the jump, in which he bypassed the rank of admiral and left behind a virtually full complement of men who were previously his seniors.

The appointment, effective July 16, puts Commodore Hennessey among a select group of five men who are heirs-apparent to the top job of chief of the defence staff after newly-appointed Gen. Jean Victor Allard retires.

## COMMANDS SHUFFLED

The posting was announced July 1 in a shuffle of top commanders involving the retirement of three senior officers at well below the normal retirement age.

They are Lt. Gen. Robert W. Moncel, 49, vice-chief of the defence staff, Vice-Admiral Kenneth L. Dyer, 50, chief of per-

sonnel, and Lt. Gen. Frank J. Fleury, 52, comptroller-general. General Moncel and Fleury have held their present posts only since last September.

Commodore Hennessey's appointment sent him past a full half-dozen rear admirals, although some of these are close to retirement if any necks were put out of joint by the shuffle. There was no public sign of it.

Defence Minister Hellyer told the Commons Thursday the reassignment of the three senior officers was "mutual understanding."

Commodore Hennessey's appointment makes him a central figure in Mr. Hellyer's team now working on integration of the armed forces.

For the last two years he has been working closely with the defence minister's office, serving first on Mr. Hellyer's manpower study group for officers and later heading a similar study for men.

STUDIED INTEGRATION

In the latter job he has been studying grass-roots problems of integration, trying to devise a program "that will appeal to individuals and motivate the ones we want to stay to remain in the services and have a satisfying and rewarding career."

The biggest problem he has found at the lower levels, has been "lack of knowledge."

"The individual non-commissioned officer is frustrated because he doesn't know where he stands.

"He doesn't know what the pattern is going to be because no one has been able to tell him—and no one has been able to tell him because it's still in the process of being worked out."

A veteran of 30 years in the navy, Commodore Hennessey has the tall, clean-cut look of a Hollywood sea captain.

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# French Group Have Objection

MONTREAL (CP)—The general council of the Societe St. Jean Baptiste strongly objected Friday to the Union Nationale government's decision to replace 300 of the 381 road signs between Ontario and Dorval on the Trans-Canada Highway at a cost of \$75,000.
