Following the reading of the minutes of the regular meeting and the special meeting, the bills were read, and two bills were moved to be paid. Correspondence was then dealt with.

A resolution was presented by the Fire Chief for the provision of ceiling hooks, rubber suits, blanket insurance covering each fireman, and a buzzer system to be installed in the home of the Fire Department members to notify them when a fire occurs. It was decided to leave this matter in the hands of the fire committee.

Councillor Coffin, chairman of the fire committee, reported that the small pumper had been returned, and said that a splendid job had been done by Mr. George MacDonald. He also reported that the firemen were having a meeting once a month, and that the team had been increased to seventeen members.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

During a rally held at Oxford University this summer, Princess Margaret Rose handed the Scroll and Log to Miss Estelle Wishart, Chief Commissioner of Canada Guides. It has come from the Isle of Wight since then it has travelled from Guide to Guide by every known method of transportation. In Canada it is being arranged to have it travel by as many means of transportation as possible. On arrival in Montague it will be met by two Guides at the entrance to the Town, then conveyed to the Legion Hall, where it will be met by a guard of honour (colour party), and guarded by two Guides, and with a change of guard each hour.
