Water Baskets Begged of Men.

"I have before me the 37th annual report of the Society for Promoting the Employment of Women. I am sorry to hear from this report that demand for women clerks and bookkeepers is on the increase.

"At the same time I am informed in other quarters that thousands of male clerks are tramping the streets of London, wearing out shoe leather in going up and down stairs in the weary work of trying to find places.

"They find instead women doing the work, which should keep them and their wives for half the pay. One has no objection to women doing manual work if they get men's pay; they may even keep the men in idleness, if they please, like the laundresses.

"How shall we make these promoters understand the cut-throat policy of pushing women in everywhere at half or quarter the pay, and driving the men abroad? However, there are other and more satisfactory features about this report.

"In the lower walks something has been done by the society in getting classes for women as shoemakers—will they ever become such admirable artists in this walk as the men?—in finding cooks and waitresses, and in getting temporary work for all kinds of women. But the numbers and figures given by our demagogue that the work of the society is but a drop in the ocean. We have 49,000,000 of people, with 20,000,000 of women and girls, and all we do at the age of 15, with an insignificant minority of about 500,000, are clamoring for work."

Music and the Mind.

All men who have any appreciation of music feel prompted to step in time to a march tune, and music on the march therefore substitutes a new and pleasanter stimulus to exertion for the monotonous and somewhat dreary work of marching in place in the ranks. It is well known that weakness is, as a rule, more a matter of mind than of body, and that the muscles of the body do not tire half so soon as the nerve centers which have to command them. Music, by bringing a fresh nerve current into play, will often banish all sense of weariness, and will even sometimes afford rest to the muscles after a march when the music ceases the soldier feels fresher than before it began. Why men's limbs should tend to move to music no one knows, but it is practically the same thing as dancing, and probably has to do with the instinct all men display, that urges them to associate themselves with what is beautiful in nature and art.

Coal Mine Worked by One Man.

The smallest coal mine in the world is in the southern province of New Zealand, where, according to the reports of the inspectors of mines for the colony, the Murray Creek Colliery is worked by one man, T. Boltho, a Chinaman, who owns, manages and works this small, but to him valuable, coal mine. There is another small colliery in the same province worked by one man with the assistance of a donkey. The next smallest colliery is in England, in the village of Nelson, in Lancashire. It is situated near the Colliers' Arms, and affords employment for two miners, father and son, who combine in themselves the positions of proprietors, managers, miners and haulers of the undertaking. They have the assistance of a donkey, and all the output of the mine is sold to the householders who live in the village or its immediate vicinity.
