## United Fund Sets Financial Targets

Financial targets, set up for various divisions of the United Fund Campaign, were announced yesterday by fund chairman, W. W. Reid.

Total objective is \$227,487. The five main geographical divisions of the campaign and their objectives are: Kings County, \$23,000; Queens County, \$36,000; Prince County, \$24,000; Charlottetown, \$118,487; and Summerside, \$36,000.

The Charlottetown division will be aiming at the following objectives: advance gifts, \$27,487; membership drive, \$100,000; national corporations, \$25,000; professional, \$8,000; local business, \$7,000; and residential, \$5,000.

The Summerside division will aim for the following targets: advance gifts, \$11,000; payroll deductions, \$17,000; professional, \$2,000; local business, \$8,000; and residential, \$3,000.

"These objectives," Mr. Reid said, "have been calculated on the basis of a 'fair share' guide for giving, that will show every one how easy it is to support the health and welfare agencies, the United Way. When a person spreads his or her gift over a 12-month period, by payroll deductions, pledges, post-dated cheques or bank debits, it is easy to give a 'fair share' of \$10."

"I am confident that the people of our province will exceed their obligations and show their generosity in supporting their United Fund. We are the first United Fund on a provincial wide scale, and we will demonstrate our belief in this campaign of people helping people and show the country that a P.E.I. is always successful."

It is suggested that a person earning \$20 per week make a monthly contribution of 75 cents. Other salaries and their appropriate contribution are set out as follows: \$30-\$39: 85c; \$40-\$49: \$1.25; \$50-\$59: \$1.50; \$60-\$69: \$1.75; \$70-\$79: \$2.00; \$80-\$89: \$2.25; \$90-\$99: \$2.50; \$100-\$120: \$3.00.

Based on yearly earnings, suggested contributions are: \$4,000-\$4,999: \$1.00; \$5,000-\$5,999: \$1.25; \$6,000-\$6,999: \$1.50; \$7,000-\$7,999: \$1.75; \$8,000-\$8,999: \$2.00; \$9,000-\$9,999: \$2.25; \$10,000-\$14,999: \$3.00.

## Work To Resume On Water Mains

The second stage in the implementation of the Pioneers Report recommendations regarding the water supply will start in this city, with work almost immediately, Sidney Green, chairman of the Commission of Sewers and Water Supply, said yesterday.

Mr. Green stated the first stage had been the bringing in of the new larger water main along Elm Avenue to cross the intersection of Eastern and Great George Streets. This was completed early, without interfering with the summer tourist traffic flow.

The new main will now be carried along Great George Street on the east side to the Charlottetown intersection. The work is being done at this time in order to have it completed and the streets back in shape before the Christmas business rush begins.

Commission Superintendent Manuel said Tuesday the job had been ordered for the job and as soon as it arrives work will start. He believes the department should be ready to go ahead by the end of this month.

**INADEQUATE SUPPLY**

The regular supper meeting of the Charlottetown Lions Club, held last evening at the Charlottetown Hotel, was high-lighted by the presentation to the P.E.I. Branch of the Canadian Institute for the Blind of a human eye thermo jug.

The presentation was made by Allison Gill to Philip Bowser, CNIB secretary for the province.

Mr. Bowser announced that this thermo jug now brings the number available in the Maritimes to eight, one at each of the CNIB offices in the area. It is noted that there is still the need for two more, before the Maritimes can be classed as fully covered.

This new jug will be kept in readiness at the Charlottetown office and will be available to hospitals and doctors throughout the province for the transporting of eyeballs eyes to wherever their destination may be, an eye bank or a waiting recipient.
