stacked against him. The combination of both the 3-0 trump break and the losing diamond finesse proved fatal.

At the other table the contract was made. Here also three rounds of spades were led and declarer ruffed. But now came a parting of the ways. This South introduced a psychological factor to increase his chances of making the contract.

He saw that if the trumps were divided 3-0, he was in danger of defeat. In anticipation of the possibility, he played a club to the king and led the jack of hearts. East, with Q-10-8, covered with the queen. Declarer won, West showing out.

It was now a simple matter to cross to dummy with a club and finesse against East's ten of hearts. The later diamond finesse lost, but declarer made four.

It may be argued that East should not have covered the jack of hearts, and no doubt a good case can be made for the contention. Had East played the eight on the jack, declarer, not having X-ray eyes, would undoubtedly have gone up with a high heart and gone down.

But it cannot be denied that the second South imaginatively created the opportunity for error and hence his play was superior to that of his counterpart at the first table.

It was a play that traded upon human frailty, could lose nothing, and had a chance to gain. What more can a declarer want?

## PLANE FARES TO BE LOWERED

MONTREAL (CP)—The International Air Transport Association said here Tuesday airline operators have agreed to introduce certain lower air fares in Europe and the Middle East.

Western hemisphere rates will remain unchanged except for some first class fares, which will be increased.

But jet-age squabbles among companies operating the major Pacific and Atlantic routes have held up agreement on trans-oceanic fares.

The announcement here follows the close of the association's annual fare meeting in Honolulu. The association meets yearly to fix the air rates of 63 airlines operating throughout the world.

European and Middle East operators agreed to introduce new, cheap holiday fares to stimulate new business.

Disagreement over Pacific and Atlantic fares comes at a time when some airlines are changing from piston to jet engines aircraft.

Some companies wanted a lower air fare. Others wanted to hold off until the effect of the new jet services can be properly gauged. They want to find out how new aircraft are going to affect finances.

W. Gordon Wood, chairman of the traffic conferences said "It is fair to say that the airlines have never before been faced with problems of such complexity or with a similar necessity for adapting themselves to several considerations (economic, technical and even political) at the same time."

Normal cargo rates on all international routes were adopted.

Provision was made for reductions in some commodity rates over the North Atlantic and a scale granting new categories of lower rates for larger shipments of general cargo was introduced on the North Atlantic and Pacific.

Interest Rate Drops Again

OTTAWA (CP)—The Bank of Canada interest rate, declining for the fourth week in a row dropped to 5.26 per cent Thursday from 5.50 last week with the sale of \$115,000,000 in 91-day government treasury bills.

The rate now has fallen by nearly nine-tenths of a point from 6.13 per cent on Sept. 17.

The bank rate—minimum charge by the central bank on the infrequent loans to chartered banks—is geared at one-quarter of one per cent above the average yield on the weekly sale of 91-day treasury bills.

The bank announced Thursday that \$115,000,000 of the bills were sold by tender at an average price of 99.766 for an average yield of 5.01 per cent. The highest yield was 5.04 per cent and the lowest 4.95.

The bank rate is considered a general reflection of conditions in the short-term money market.

The rate Thursday compares with the record high of 6.41 per cent on Aug. 13 and the record low of 1.12 per cent on July 31 last year.

The government also sold 20,000,000 in 181-day treasury bills Thursday at an average price of 97.338 to yield 5.51 per cent. Highest yield was 5.54 per cent and the lowest was 5.48 per cent.

The sale of a total \$135,000,000 in the two maturities of treasury bills equals the amount of bills falling due this week. A similar amount of bills will be offered for sale next week.

LOTS OF LARKS

HAMILTON (CP)—Steel is not a problem for Studebaker-Packard of Canada and production of 1960 Larks at the Hamilton plant will not be interrupted, an S-spokesman said Thursday. Big Three spokesmen said Wednesday that production stoppages loom in their Canadian plants as their supplies of steel parts made in United States plants dwindle.
