## BRITISH ELECTIONS YESTERDAY

### Conservatives Gain 12 Liberals 3 Seats.

#### AN INCREASED CONSERVATIVE MAJORITY ASSURED.

#### Workmen Support Conservatives.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The khaki boom has swept the country. Yesterday's pollings are a tale of increased Ministerial and diminished Liberal majorities.

The returns from the rural districts to-day, Friday, and to-morrow may do something to rehabilitate the Liberals. The results thus far have fully justified Mr. Chamberlain and the party organizers who are backing the government in their choice of a moment to dissolve parliament.

Few will doubt that an appeal to the country a month or two earlier would have produced an even more remarkable Unionist curbst. Nevertheless the Ministerialists may already congratulate themselves on being returned with an increased majority.

Yesterday the Conservatives gained twelve seats as against three gained by the Liberals. The workingmen of the country have replied in a very decided voice in favor of the annexation of the republics.

## LATEST NEWS FROM S. AFRICA

### Hart and Buller Capture Sheep and Cattle

#### A FEW SMALL SKIRMISHES

#### And Much Very Heavy Marching.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Lord Roberts wires the following to the War Office: General Hart has returned to Krugersdorp, Oct 1st. He has been thirty-three days from his base, marched 310 miles, was in contact with the enemy thirty-nine times, killed an unknown number and captured twenty-six. The British lost three killed, three prisoners and twenty-four wounded. General Hart brought back 3520 head of cattle and 3281 sheep.

General Buller has returned to Eysenberg from Speke Skop with a thousand sheep.

There are skirmishes with the Boers daily; but they are small affairs.

The Dublin Fusiliers made a night assault with the bayonet on a Boer laager between Pretoria and Johannesburg and captured nine men—mostly important Boers who have troubled the district.

A party of Boers have penetrated to the southern part of the Orange River Colony, entering Dewetsdorp. Detachment are after them.

## SCHOONER CAPSIZED

### Crew Rescued and Taken to St. Vincent

LONDON, October 5.—The Portuguese schooner *Vera Cruise*, Capt. Bengoe, from St. John, August 20, for St. Vincent, C. V., capsized in the gale of September. Eighteen of the crew were rescued and taken off by the American ship *St. Paul*, from New York for Hong Kong, which landed them at St. Vincent.

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**SIR LOUIS'**

**Deckload Law Badly Bungled.**

OTTAWA, October 4.—An extraordinary condition of affairs has developed in connection with the administration of Sir Louis Davies, of the winter deckload law. For many years past steamers and sailing vessels leaving Canadian ports between October 1st and March 16th, for ports in the United Kingdom or the continent, have been restricted from carrying deckloads exceeding three feet in height. At the request of various parties interested in the wood trade, the Government last year agreed to extend the unlimited deckload period for steamers leaving Canadian ports from the 1st until October 12th. Instead of framing the new legislation in this manner the act was amended in such a way that it gave unlimited deckloads from the 1st of January up to Oct 12th, whereas the intention was that the provision should only apply from March 16th to October 12th. Not realizing the mistake which had been made in the statute, officials of the Government in the Maritime Provinces, this year, continued to restrict deckloads between January 1st and March 16th, although entirely unwarranted by the law. Thirty-four steamers in St. John alone were prevented by the officers of the Minister of Marine from taking the cargoes which Sir Louis Davies, by his own legislation, had authorized them to carry.

On one ship alone this illegal restriction cost the owners the loss of \$3,500 in freight, while the total loss in freights last winter in St. John alone is estimated at between \$25,000 and \$50,000. The steamship owners threaten to claim indemnity from the Government for their losses.
