LOYAL CRUSADERS.—The closing meeting of Company "A" last evening was largely attended and the proceedings throughout were of a very pleasant character. The songs, recitations and dialogues by the children were capital, and the addresses by Messrs Chappell, Lawson, McGillivray and Crabbe interesting and helpful. After receiving the total abstinence pledge the meeting closed until October. Miss Annie Elliott presided at the organ.

INQUEST.—The inquest in view of the body of the late Allan McInnis began last evening before Coroner Conroy and a jury. After hearing the evidence of the wife of the deceased and of Philip Curly, Michael McCarthy and James F. Guessey, the enquiry was adjourned until this evening at seven o'clock for the testimony of Dr. Kelly who is to make a post mortem examination of the body. The evidence taken last evening was along the line of the story told in our issue of yesterday.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School board was held last evening. The teachers reports showed the enrollment to be 1438, 838 boys and 600 girls. It was decided to close the schools on June 30th, and to reopen them on Tuesday, Sept 6th. Prince Street will hold their closing exercises from 9 to 10, West Kent 10.30 to 11.30, Queen Square 12 to 1. Miss Yeo was appointed on the teaching staff of Prince Street school to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss McDonald.

OF INTEREST TO MILITIAMEN.—The St. John Sun says: A course in equitation will be conducted in St John from July 5th to August 4th. A staff of instructors and six horses will be brought from Toronto. This course is open to officers of dismounted corps of field rank, and adjutants, also to officers next in order for promotion to field rank. The course is open to officers from country as well as city corps, the former to be given transportation and one dollar per day while here. Hereafter it is intended that all officers required by the regulations to have a certificate in equitation must have one. After the course is completed here there will be special courses given by the same staff at Charlottetown and Halifax.
