PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The public are cordially invited to the annual meeting of the P. E. Island Hospital this evening at 8 o'clock in the parlour of the Y. M. C. A. The financial statement of the institution will be presented, also a full account of the progress made in the erection of the new hospital.
QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.—Queen's weather prevailed throughout yesterday and the holiday was generally observed. The display of bunting was generous. The stores and public offices were closed, and the excursions by rail and steamboat were liberally patronized. There were also several very enjoyable private picnics and fishing excursions. The usual salute was fired from Fort Edward at noon.
SUDDEN DEATH.—Particulars of the sad death of Mr. Philip Kennedy, of Montague, were telephoned us this morning. Mr. Kennedy and his son went last evening to Macdonald's Mills, at the head of Montagu River, to fish. After some time Mr. Kennedy became tired and lay down and died almost immediately. The probable cause of death was heart disease. Mr. Kennedy came to Montague from Ireland about thirty years ago. He married a Miss Landrigan, of Sturgeon, who, with several children survives him.
THE COBAN.—The steamer Coban, of the Black Diamond Line, left yesterday for St. John's, Nfld., via Sydney, with a large cargo, which included 102 cattle, 60 sheep, 2 horses, 1,500 bags oats and 600 bags potatoes. Captain Fraser, Steward McLellan, and the other officers of the steamer were given a hearty welcome by their many friends at this port. The Coban has always been popular with shippers and the travelling public, and it is expected that her trade this year will be very large. THE OPERA HOUSE.—There was a fairly large audience at the Opera House last evening when the "Volunteers; or the Pride of Company G," was put upon the boards for the benefit of the Ategweit-Crescent Athletic Association. The manner of presentation was capital, and the different characters were well sustained. Between the acts there were pleasing specialties by Miss Nellie Robin, and Messrs Hennessey and McLunis. The musical programme rendered by Viani combe's orchestra was excellent.

BOATING ACCIDENT.—A boating accident that came very nearly resulting in the loss of life occurred in Charlottetown harbor yesterday afternoon. It seems that three young men, Robert Croke, Stanley Jost and Joseph Murphy, were rowing in a canvas boat, and somewhere near the black buoy their craft filled with water and upset, precipitating its occupants into the water. Young Murphy could not swim, and would have been drowned were it not for the heroic conduct of Croke who kept him afloat until help arrived. When rescued Murphy was in an unconscious condition, and was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital where everything possible was done for him. The party were rescued by Mr. Robert Horne, who was in another boat about three-quarters of a mile away. Mr. Horne witnessed the accident and rowed with all speed to the scene. Murphy was taken from the hospital to his home this forenoon, all right again.
