The Ontario License Act. OTTAWA, May 1. The Liquor License Act which was passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario, at its late session, has been disallowed by the Governor-General.

A Town Destroyed by Fire. SACKVILLE, N. B., May 1. We learn by telegraph this morning that the town of Presque Isle, Maine, was totally destroyed by fire—only one or two buildings being left standing.

Dynamiters at Work in Toronto. TORONTO, April 30. A profound sensation was caused to-day by the finding of several dynamite cartridges which were placed under the Parliament building.

A Royal Marriage. DARMSTADT, April 30. The marriage of Princess Victoria Hesse to Prince Louis Battenburg, took place to-day. All the guests except Queen Victoria attended the banquet in the evening.

Poorhouse Burned—16 Lives Lost. KALAMAZOO, Mich., April 30. The Poorhouse at Vanburen County, located near Hartford, Mich., was burned last night, and sixteen of the inmates lost their lives in the flames.

Awaiting an Explanation. LONDON, April 30. The Paris correspondent of the Times says that Premier Ferry awaits fresh explanation from England before accepting the invitation to the Egyptian conference.

Bass is Dead. LONDON, April 30. Sir Michael Arthur Bass, member of Parliament for Staffordshire East, and head of the famous brewing firm of Bass & Co., at Burton-on-Trent, is dead, aged forty-seven.

A Fatal Explosion—21 Killed. HAVANA, April 30. The number killed and wounded by the explosion of the powder magazine and gas works, yesterday, is twenty-one killed and seventy-nine wounded.

Death Sentence Committed. GALVESTON, Tex., April 30. Governor Ireland has commuted the death sentence of Perry Cavitt to imprisonment for life. Cavitt was to have been hanged in May.

The Relief of Gordon. LONDON, April 30. Sir Evelyn Baring has advised the Government to abandon the Sudan after relieving Gen. Gordon.

Blaine the Choice. KANSAS, April 30. The Republican State Convention yesterday elected unopposed delegates; but Blaine was the choice of the majority of the delegates.

A Fatal Riot. LONDON, April 30. A riot occurred among the striking laborers in diamond fields. The police, in attempting to suppress the outbreak, killed several.
