Trotting Association, Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. I. is second with \$307,770.20. Thursday morning we picked up The Guardian and saw a despatch from Columbus, Ohio, as follows: "Joe O'Brien of Shafter, Calif., was the Grand Circuit's leading driver in 1954 both in money and races won."

The Circuit's public information office here said O'Brien, formerly of Alberton, P. E. I., won \$218,837 and 70 races during the year, the first time the 37-year-old driver won either championship.

The Grand Circuit harness sport tours the country annually from New York to California making stops at night pari-mutuel tracks and city and county fairs along the way.
