

Successful Tryon Native Dies After Long Career In Alberta

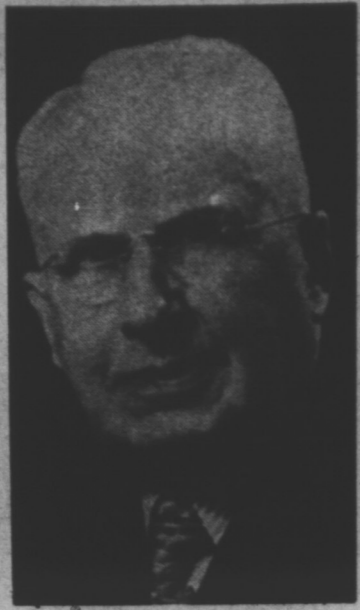
George Lord, Central Bedouque, received word that his brother William E. Lord of Red Deer Alberta had died on May 8th.

He was born at Tryon in 1870 a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Curcio Lord, where he received his primary education, and at an early age he was employed as a clerk with the firm of Benj. Rogers and Co., Alberton; and later as a commercial traveller for a wholesale firm in Halifax, travelling across Canada from coast to coast. Around the turn of the century he went into the merchandise at Wolsley, and in 1905 located in Red Deer, Alta., where he opened up a large general store with a branch store at Lacombe.

In 1928 he sold his stores to T. Eaton and Co. and went into the automobile business, erecting a large garage and sales show room, where he and his son Ralph carried on extensive repair work, with the seeling agency for the Chevrolet and Oldsmobile cars.

His son Ralph enlisted in World War II and wished to locate permanently in England, and as Mr. Lord was then 76 years of age, in 1946 they sold out this large garage and Ralph returned to England and Mr. Lord retired from business life, although he remained active in church, fraternal and social activities until a few months previous to his death.

He was the first president of an Agricultural Society formed in Red Deer to sponsor organization of the Exhibition in that town now a city. He was a Charter member of the Golf and Country Club, and also of the Rotary

Club and served as president for a term in each. He was a P.M. of No. 12 A.F. and A.M. and was a member of St. Lukes, Anglican Church.

He served from 1913 to 1918 as Alderman for the city of Red Deer and in 1919 was elected Mayor for a two year term.

Mrs. Lord died in 1963 and he leaves to mourn one son Ralph Camberley in England; three grand-children, three sisters Miss Janie M. Lord, Red Deer, Mrs. Irene Richardson, Galt, Ontario (Mabel) Mrs. Hance Hunter, Saint John, N.B., and one brother George at Central Bedouque, P.E.I. Funeral service was held May 11th., from St. Lukes Anglican Church with the pastor, Canon E.G. Flagg officiating.

It is this second meaga of Christ himself, in addition to his holding the office of teacher, ruler and priest, was a worker. To all his followers he has bequeathed the ministry of service not only to God, but to man: "What you do to the least of my brethren you do unto Me." And one of the greatest means of doing the work of Christ is by showing forth a thoroughly Christ-like character.

It has often been said that character is power. The silent witness of a true, unselfish, godly life carries a great charm and influence. By manifesting the character of Christ in our lives we are co-operating with Him in the noble work of saving souls, and the wider our sphere of influence the more good we can do.

Such a noble character is, of course, an attainment, not an inheritance; something that comes to us not by pure accident but by persevering effort, assisted by the merits of Christ and the grace of the good God: "Without Me you can do nothing."

But once such a character is formed according to divine likeness it is a most effective and versatile instrument in sowing the seeds of the Gospel in the hearts of our fellowmen, when our every action bears witness to the principles of Christ and when His glory is the motive of our work, then we are doing that kind of good which "puts to silence the ignorance of foolish men."

We should be conscious of the fact that every soul has what we might call its own atmosphere. It may be charged with the life-giving powers of faith, fortitude and fidelity to duty; it may be heavy with the gloom of discontent or despair; it may be sunk in its own selfishness, or even poisonous with the taint of sin.

Amid all such, we who are Christ's followers face the responsibility of providing a holy and wholesome influence.

Our words and our actions bear an invitation to follow Christ or to ignore him: "He who is not with me is against me." From the impression we make by word and action come good or evil effects which none can measure.

Every good impulse thus imparted is a seed sown which will produce its harvest. Occasionally at least it will fall on good soil and bring forth fruit a hundredfold.

The humble duties of life can likewise be so great a power for good that we should not neglect them nor underestimate their influence. Wherever you may be Christ bids you take up the duty that presents itself. If this is in the hope you should strive to make that home a haven of contentment; if you are a mother, train your children for Christ. This is as truly a work for God as that of the preacher in the pulpit. Let them see in you and in your home that unity peace and Christ-likeness that should be the fruit of your own union with Christ.

In whatever trade or occupation we may find ourselves, we must all become apostles, filled with the constant desire to win others to Christ.

So live, then, that men will see clearly that you do believe what you profess to believe. So live that men will see, even against their will, that you have something they have not and sorely want—an inner source of strength, courage, joy and love.
