Last season good prices were obtained, but the catch being unusually large, there was a large stock kept over, which is the principal cause of the present low prices.

FASTER THAN A MILE A MINUTE.—The train which conveyed His Excellency the Governor General and party from St. John to Fredericton, probably eclipsed all previous authentic records of travelling by rail in New Brunswick. The trip up was made in 1h. 55m., including stops, or 1h. 30n. actual running time for the 65 miles.

THE SCOTT ACT IN NEW GLASGOW, N. S.—At a meeting of the contributors to the Scott Act fund, held in New Glasgow on the 21st inst., it was unanimously resolved that a public meeting be held that day week, in order that steps might be taken to have the act enforced, as legal advice had been received from Halifax that the law was now all right, and could be made effective for the suppression of the liquor traffic.

A REMARKABLE OCCURRENCE.—On Wednesday night last, at Pennic, about five miles above Gibson, N. B., on the Miramichi Valley Railway, a man named Michael O'Brien while asleep on the track, between the sleepers and one car, but remarkably so, he escaped uninjured. The road was not ballasted at that point and it is supposed he lay between the sleepers while the train passed over him.

CAPT. SCOTT, who was commissioned by the Minister of Marine to investigate the circumstances attending the abandonment of the "Annie" of Halifax, N. S., at sea on the 15th of December, 1884, has presented his report which has been approved by the Minister. The circumstances show that the vessel was not waterlogged by design on the part of the master, but through ignorance of his duty. It is recommended that Captain Cameron's service certificate be cancelled, but in consideration that he has undergone three months imprisonment at the common jail, Liverpool, England, for the offence, he should be permitted to present himself for examination for a new certificate whenever he is prepared to do so.

THE exports of the Dominion for the month of September were \$8,837,363, of which \$7,955,63 were produce of Canada, \$77,895 produce of other countries, and \$400 coin and bullion. The imports for home consumption were \$9,980,131 of which \$7,562,574 were dutiable, \$2,408,376 free goods, and \$9,181 coin and bullion.

They are also negotiating for the construction of two more steamers—one of about 250 tons—for parties abroad.

MR. GEORGE E. ROBINSON left for Halifax this morning to attend the fourth year of his course at Dalhousie. Convocation meets to-morrow, and the inaugural address is to be delivered by Dr. Alexander, formerly of Prince of Wales College, and at present Professor of English and English literature at the above University. We shall look forward with interest to a report of his address.

SPIRITUALLY PARALYZED.—The Moncton Transcript says:—On Thursday last a man who said he came from P. E. Island and was bound to be arrested by Marshal Thibodeau for being "spiritually paralyzed." He had a considerable amount of money on his person, of which the Marshal took charge. He will come before the stipendiary to-day, and will probably contribute something to the civic treasury.

The distillers of Ontario held a meeting on Monday in Toronto. The meeting, it is understood, thought too much money had been spent to no purpose in fighting the Scott Act in the courts. It was thought that the only thing left was to fight it in parliament. Whether they can induce the brewers to join them is not yet settled—the brewers are half inclined to throw the distillers overboard if they thought Parliament would remove beer and light wines from the scope of the Act. At all events, the fight at Ottawa will be a bitter one, as it is determined to kill the Scott Act some way.

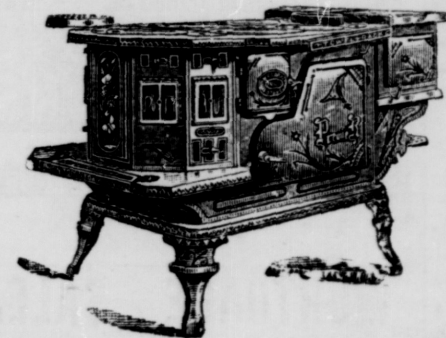
