Three Charges Of Uttering Bring Jail Terms On Each

SUMMERSIDE — A town resident, John Cudmore, drew three separate sentences of two months each in Prince County jail yesterday when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald on three charges of uttering forged documents. The sentences are to run concurrently.

The accused was also ordered to make restitution with the penalty for default being one month in jail.

The impaired driving case of William Everett Reeves of South Freetown was dismissed by Magistrate MacDonald. Reeves, who was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald, had pleaded not guilty to the charge at an earlier hearing.

Marshall Green of Albany pleaded guilty, through his attorney, Bernard St. Clair Mc-

Cube, to two charges of speeding and was fined \$10 and costs on each charge.

G. Bruce MacDonald entered a plea of guilty to a charge of speeding for Jules Poirier of Miscouche and a fine of \$10 was assessed.

A Charlottetown resident, Hollis Corney, was let off with a warning when he pleaded guilty to a charge of operating an unregistered vehicle.

For operating a vehicle not properly equipped with brakes, Merrill Cameron of Wellington was fined \$20 and costs.

Norman Leslie Reeves of North Bedouque was fined \$10 and costs for driving a vehicle which was insufficiently equipped.

A Borden man, Wayne Lawson, was fined \$10 and costs for speeding.

Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, adjourned two cases of selling liquor to another person after Frederick Bernard Dooley and Mrs. Rose Gauthier, both of Charlottetown, pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Their cases were adjourned to April 15 and April 12. Dooley was represented by A. M. Gillis, and Mrs. Gauthier was represented by G. R. Foster, QC.

Six other cases were on the docket in yesterday's city police court.

The case of Wilfred Laybolt of Charlottetown, charged with theft of two boxes of pork valued at less than \$50.00 was dismissed. Counsel for the accused was F. A. Large, QC.

Frederick J. Vissey of Charlottetown, arraigned on a

charge of operating a motor vehicle with defective brakes, had his case adjourned to April 12.

Four residents of Charlottetown were charged with being drunk and inebriate. One accused was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days in jail, a third was given a 20-day suspended sentence and the fourth had his case dismissed.

Dates Are Announced For Red Cross Course

Dr. K. A. Parker, chairman of the advisory committee of the Junior Red Cross, announced the dates of a high school Red Cross leadership course to be staged at Mount Allison University. The dates of the course are from July 27 to Aug. 4 inclusive.

Approximately 100 students and staff members are expected from the four Atlantic provinces, and three guests, a leader and two students, will be invited from the United States.

Full information on the project will be going out to the high schools within the next two weeks, Dr. Parker said, and he added that a May 28 deadline had been set for applications. Expenses of the individual delegates are shared by their parents and the schools they represent.

Purpose of the centre is "to develop a group of student leaders who have an understanding of the philosophy and program of the Red Cross, to enable them to lead active branches of the high school Red Cross in their respective communities," he stated. "The centre will also provide an opportunity for the type of democratic living that helps to produce community-minded citizens."

Named to key responsibilities in centre planning and operation are Miss Marion B. Bate, Saint John, New Brunswick, director of the Junior Red Cross, who will serve as administrative director, and Mrs. Blanche S. Baker, Halifax, Nova Scotia, director of the junior society, who is to act in the capacity of program director. Miss Bate coordinated the first Atlantic Provinces leadership training centre, held at Mount A. in 1959, and Mrs. Baker was in charge of last year's project, conducted on the campus of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S. Abitibi Company Earnings Show Little Change

TORONTO (CP)—Earnings of Abitibi Power and Paper Co. Ltd. in the first quarter will be approximately the same or maybe slightly better than the first quarter of last year, President P. E. Roberts said Thursday.

Earnings for the first quarter of 1964 were \$3,387,883 or 19.4 cents a share.

Mr. Roberts told the annual meeting capital expenditures for this year and the early months of 1966 will be about \$35,000,000 compared with \$20,000,000 in 1964.

He said the expenditures are made according to a plan, not just to grow larger, but to diversify Abitibi's product line.

Expansion is planned at the company's Smooth Rock Falls, Ont., Kraft Pulp Mill; Provincial Paper's Port Arthur mill; The Miratile plant in Chicago; a groundwood plant at Beaupre, Que.; and New Miratile plant at Cucamonga, Calif.; and construction of research centre.

The squadron, which has been stationed as a peace-keeping force in Cyprus for the last six months, is expected to land in Alberta. A leave of absence will be later granted enabling Tpr. Meredith to return home for a visit.

In the army since 1960, he has served with this Calgary-based squadron for the past two years. The Reconnaissance Squadron of the Lord Strathcona's Horse has been the second Canadian contingent into Cyprus since the start of trouble nearly a year ago and is being relieved by a third contingent which has recently disembarked for that area.
