

# Makes Strong Appeal For Transportation

OTTAWA (Special) An appeal for more ferry service to meet the mounting demands of Prince Edward Island's tourist traffic was launched in the Senate Wednesday by Hon. Elsie Ingham.

Continuing the debate on the Draft Address, Senator Ingham said the amount of money spent in the Province after the order of five million dollars a year, this could be doubled by more efficient transportation to and from the province should not be considered out of reason, whether by causeway or by providing more and larger boats. Perhaps a large automobile ferry would meet the needs until we get the causeway.

**TOURISTS AFFECTED**

It was a decided deterrent to the tourist industry of the Province, Senator Ingham said that summer visitors are very often stranded for hours at the existing ferry terminals, waiting for the ferry "Abegweit" and emphasized that tourists will not travel by routes which subject them to annoyances of this kind.

# Spuris Native Named To Post Office Position At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—Wildred C. Maceachern, 64, a native of Souris, P. E. I., has been named chief executive officer of the post office department, has been announced. The appointment, effective Dec. 1, is to one of two posts formerly held by Deputy Postmaster-General George A. Boyle.

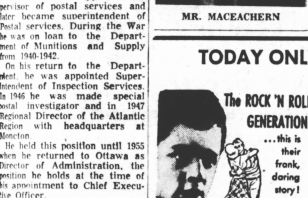
Before being named deputy minister, in succession to Walter Turnbull, now on retirement leave, Mr. Boyle was associate deputy minister and chief executive officer of the department, announced that no new associate deputy minister is to be named.

He entered the postal service as headquarters in Ottawa in 1911 as a clerk and through common promotion was named general clerk in 1919. Two years later he was named chief clerk in Ottawa headquarters.

In 1939 he was appointed supervisor of postal services and later became superintendent of postal services. During the war he was on loan to the Department of Munitions and Supply from 1940-1942.

On his return to the Department he was appointed Superintendent of Inspection Services. In 1946 he was made special mail investigator and in 1947 Regional Director of the Atlantic Region with headquarters at Moncton.

He held this position until 1955 when he returned to Ottawa as Director of Administration, the position he holds at the time of his appointment to Chief Executive Officer.

# Heavy Docket Yesterday For Magistrate At Georgetown

Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet disposed of a heavy docket in Magistrate's Court at Georgetown on Wednesday.

A Souris resident was sentenced to 60 days in jail after pleading guilty to a charge of damage of property at the residence of John Francis Kickham of Souris West. The same party was sentenced to 30 days in jail for creating a disturbance on the highway by being drunk. The same party was ordered to enter into a bond of \$500.00 to keep the peace for one year for making threats to commit assault. He was represented by L. P. O'Donnell.

Another resident of Souris was fined \$20.00 after pleading guilty to doing damage to the property of John Francis Kickham. This party was also represented by L. P. O'Donnell.

A resident of Little Harbor was sentenced to 30 days in jail for creating a disturbance by fighting in Souris. The same party was also charged with resisting arrest and on this charge was remanded for two weeks.

Another resident of Little Harbor pleaded not guilty to obstructing a peace officer in the lawful execution of his duty. Evidence was taken and the case was dismissed.

A resident of Souris was sentenced to 30 days in jail for

creating a disturbance by fighting. This party was also charged with resisting arrest and was remanded on this charge for two weeks.
