In the month of August, 12,721 miles of railway track were laid in the United States.

The Massachusetts Democratic State convention has nominated General Butler for the Governorship.

It is estimated that \$25,000,000 have been lost in the United States by labor strikes during the present year.

The officials of the national observatory at Washington report the appearance of an immense daylight comet five degrees from the sun.

Ross has telegraphed to Hanlan that he will meet him in Portland, Maine, on the 26th of this month to arrange for a race. Wallace is quite willing to meet Hanlan.

MR. DANIEL SULLIVAN of Campbellton is said to have killed a very large bear one day last week. The estimated weight of the animal was over three hundred pounds.

CHIEF JUSTICE COLERIDGE says that eight-tenths of crime that comes into court results from drink, for which the British people pay \$500,000,000 or \$600,000,000 annually.

A MATCH running race for \$200 a side, between the two well-known Nova Scotia horses "Bonnie Doo" and "Electrician" came off at Kentville a few days ago. "Electrician" won in two straight heats.

ITALY and Austria are co-operating in an endeavor to set out an influential and extensive secret society, of Nihilistic convictions, whose emissaries have recently caused much uneasiness and alarm in Austria.

In the examination for the Gilchrist Scholarship, John Peters McLeod, of Dalhousie College, stands third in the Honors division; and Edward Harris, Esq., of King's College, N. S., is placed in the University First Division.

The 101st Regiment, now at Halifax, will shortly be transferred to Portsmouth, and will not be replaced, the garrison consisting only of one line regiment, three batteries of artillery, and one company of the Royal Engineers.

As part of Wednesday's holiday diversion in Montreal, Capt. Webb jumped from the yard-arm of an ocean ship, some sixty feet down into the water, and delighted 20,000 spectators who were witnesses of his wonderful feats of swimming.

The Ontario provincial fair dates back to 1846, and for the last twenty years has awarded annually between \$10,000 and \$15,000 in prizes. The Manitoba exhibit this year is noteworthy.

MANY of our townspeople will be sorry to hear of the death of Rev. S. O'Neill, a member of the Society of St. John the Evangelist. The rev. gentleman, together with the Rev. R. M. Benson, took part in a mission in this town about thirteen years ago. Since then he has been working as an active missionary in India, and has at last fallen in his noble fight. He was buried in one of the English cemeteries in India.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.—The St. John News says: On Tuesday evening, John Athkrow, an inebriate Islander, was passing along Brussels street, when he was set upon by two men, one of whom held his hands while the other gagged him and removed a purse containing \$19. The "North Star," a New Bedford whaler, has suffered a fate like the "Jeannette's," being crushed in ice of the Arctic about a dozen miles from Point Barrow, where the signal station is established. The lot of this vessel is a hard one, for it was the "North Star" that, by much exertion, took off the crew of the "Rodgers," and transferred them to the Crown. The story of the journey of the wrecked whalers over the icebergs to Point Barrow, now dragging their boats over lofty barriers, and now digging tunnels, is a terrible one; but they were at least fortunate in being near help at the time of the disaster.

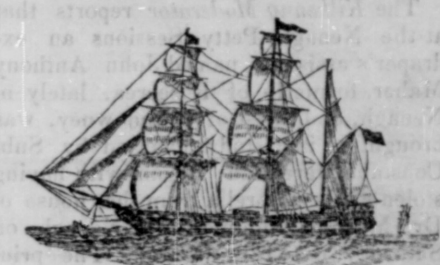
