New Traffic Act Best in Canada

Close to 150 pages in length, the new Highway Traffic Act, which went into committee stage for second reading, will be the newest and most up-to-date of any traffic legislation in Canada. It is claimed.

Promoter of the act is Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart.

The new act is intended to provide for traffic lights and Crosswalks on provincial highways, similar to those in Charlottetown.

There is also provision for the estimating of inspection of depots in the province in which all vehicles, at one time or another, may have to be inspected for mechanical defects before they can be operated on the highway.

Another provision allows for a traffic force that could be set up under the direction of the provincial secretary.

SPEED LIMITS
It appears that there will be no change in highway speed limits in the new act, but there is provision which allows a motorist, who is apparently loitering or moving at such a pace that he is holding up traffic, can be charged with a violation.

Some changes will be made in the qualifications for licenses being issued. As an example, a person who has a license to operate a half-ton truck would not be allowed to drive a larger truck or a truck, but would need another license to operate a truck.

The new act also does away with the licensing of farm tractors.

Mr. Stewart said that traffic legislation of most provinces was borrowed and some of it adapted to fit into the new act. "The act," he said, "contains

the advantages of the best legislation of other provinces."
He said the new act was badly needed, and took about two years to prepare. It was pointed out that the Liberals, when in power, had seen the necessity of a new act but did not get around to completing the mammoth job.

In the Legislature yesterday, Opposition Leader A. W. Mainstone called the bill "one of the most important pieces of legislation ever to come before the House." He said he hoped that the act will be written in terms easily understood by the man on the street.

"We tried to draw it up in common sense language," said Mr. Stewart.
