BAD VOLCANIC ERUPTION.

Four Hundred People Lose their Lives.

They Perished in the Burning Ashes Before They Could Escape.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—News from Manilla gives graphic details of a great eruption of Mayon volcano, on Luzon Island. Four hundred people perished by being burned in the burning ashes before they could escape. Towns and villages around its base were ruined.

Peace Conference Meeting.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—A despatch from Constantinople says the meeting of the Peace Conference today is likely to develop a crisis. It is understood that Sir Philip Currie, British Ambassador to Turkey, has received fresh instructions, the nature of which will be developed at the meeting.

Big Money in Wheat.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 23.—According to the operators on change here Duluth traders have cleared from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 by the recent advance in wheat.

Passed Sunday Quietly.

DUBLIN, Aug. 23.—The Duke and Duchess of York passed Sunday quietly visiting South Castle where they were guests of Lord Ashbourne.

THE UPRISING IN INDIA.

LEADERS OF THE TRIBES OFFER COMPLETE SUBMISSION

Mails and Brides for Alaska—The Peary Expedition—Other News.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The Daily Chronicle publishes this morning an interview with Lord Frederick Roberts, of Kandahar, commander of the forces in Ireland, with reference to the disturbances in Swat Valley and the Indian risings generally. Lord Roberts said: "There is no cause for alarm or anxiety. The movement is wholly fanatical. We have a large body of magnificent troops on the frontier, officered by highly experienced commanders and capable of coping with any difficulty likely to arise."

LONDON, Aug. 20.—A despatch to the Times from Chakdara says that the religious leaders of all the tribes in the Upper Swat Valley have written to the Government offering complete submission on any terms proposed.

SIMLA, Aug. 20.—General Blood, commander of the British forces operating against insurgent tribesmen on the frontier reached Galagal without opposition. He reports that the villages have been deserted and adds that the Afridi rising is exaggerated, adding that they have not left there.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—The United States government has consented to an arrangement for the carriage of mails to Dawson City. Canada is to establish the service and the United States is to contribute towards the expense, and also in addition to convey the mails between Victoria and Dyea where the Canadian department will take them on to Dawson.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—Of the nine aldermen who resigned over the purchase of two American fire engines, eight were re-elected by acclamation today. In the meantime the city council has dropped the purchase of one engine. The agents have made over to the corporation five hundred dollars, representing their commission on the other.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 20.—The dwelling house of George Hudson, a farmer living 12 miles west of Rapid City, was burned to the ground and Mrs. Hudson and four children burned to death. Hudson was away from home at the time and the tragedy was not discovered until his return.

TORONTO, Aug. 20.—The Ontario crop reports show the yields of the year on the whole to exceed those of the last year and also an average of the previous fifteen years. Fall wheat shows an increased average, an increased yield per acre, an increased value in the market over last year. The hay crop was heavy. Apples are in small supply.

OLA, S. D., Aug. 20.—L. M. Keenan will send a consignment of marriageable young women to Alaska in the spring. He is in earnest. He intends spending the winter scouting the matrimonial range in the states in search of material for the venture. The first steamboat up the Yukon in 1898 will carry his stock to market. He will pay their fares to the Klondyke. The entire stock will be auctioned off to the miners. A clergyman will accompany the outfit. Each maiden will be pledged before her departure not to leave the steamboat until she and her would be partner have been married in due and proper form.

St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 20.—A message has been received from Turnaveck on the coast of Labrador, dated July 28, stating that the steamer Hope, with Lt. R. E. Peary's expedition, had touched there that day and sailed again on its way to Greenland. All on board were reported to be well.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 20.—It is reported that the famous Sultana mine at Rat Portage has changed hands, but the owners refuse to confirm the rumor. The consideration is said to be two million dollars.

CORNWALL, Ont., August 19.—A young child of Mr. Dawson Major, of South Branch, fell into a pot of hot water today and was so badly scalded that it died.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 20.—It is estimated that the U. S. battleship Indiana spent \$2,000 at this port.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 20.—The city is almost in a panic to-night over the news of bomb explosions attempted or accomplished this afternoon at different points. The explosions are attributed to Armenians. At 3 o'clock a bomb was thrown just outside the police headquarters in the Pera district. It failed to explode. Almost at the same moment an Armenian whose name it is believed is Caravbet was arrested at the imperial Ottoman in the Calata district. He was carrying a package of explosives which he was trying to ignite.

AN ISLAND COLT

That Performs as Well as the Majority Seen in the Circus Ring.

James McConnell, of Dromore, P. E. I. has a year old colt, which has been taught several things not usually seen outside a circus ring. The colt, which answers to the name of Harry, when called will advance towards his master and bow several times, then put his head on his master's shoulder, and on his hand. He will then at the word of command, lay down on the ground, and stretch out his feet, and when asked, "Are you sick Harry?" will groan, as if suffering the most intense pain.

He is then told to get up, but Harry does not stir, which almost convinces the bystanders that the colt is really sick, but when his master threatens to throw cold water on him he quickly gets on his feet. He then crosses his right foot to left and left to right. He then crosses one hind leg behind the other and holds it up from the ground.

Harry is then told to back and gee, which he quickly does, and follows the whip, running round his trainer as closely as possible for him to get. That part of the programme shows intelligence and good training, as most horses flee from the whip. He then advances and puts his head into a halter, and gets weighed by putting his fore paw on his master's hand and leans forward on him. Harry will pick up his master's coat, vest, whip, or other article ordered and carry it to him. He then gets on a sea-saw composed of two boards, one over the other, in the absence of a proper plank, which rest on a block of wood about a foot in height. The block is placed under the middle of the board and of course is a foot from the floor. Harry is told to put one foot on the end of the board to hold it down; this he does; and then walks upon the board which is only about 8 or 10 inches wide, until he gets in the centre, when at a given word, he tilts himself, until ordered to come down. Mr. McConnell says the colt has forgotten some of his pet tricks, owing to his master being away from home for the last three months.—Sackville Post.
