

Sydney Millionaires Edge Islanders 3-2 In Game Played At New Glasgow

NEW GLASGOW, (CP) — The Charlottetown Islanders removed their goalie during the game's last 15 seconds but couldn't click as Sydney Millionaires edged them 3-2 in a Maritime Major Hockey League tilt Tuesday night before 1,600 fans.

Sydney remained five points behind the league-leading Halifax Atlantics, who downed Glace Bay Miners 13-4 in the other league game. If Charlottetown had won they would have moved out of the cellar one point ahead of Miners.

Sydney took a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Charlie Marshall and Lorne Pirie. The second goal, came while Islanders were without Orrin Carver, penalized for high-sticking.

Vince Palladino made it 2-1 as Charlottetown controlled the play in the second. The difference was in Sydney's Norm Defelice's goal tending who turned aside several power plays.

Sydney's Roger Dubuc scored early in the third, but Palladino notched another midway in the period to make it 3-2. Charlottetown's offensive strength wilted after that.

The game, played here to ease travelling pressure on the teams, started 1 1/2 hours late because

"Satch, because of his age, just wouldn't fit into our plans to build up the Orioles," Art Ehlers, general manager, said in announcing the release.

Satch's age has been the subject of considerable speculation. The Orioles carried his date of birth as Sept. 11, 1904 which would make him 49.



The Halifax Atlantics can't be counted out of the running for Maritime Major League honors yet. The Atlantics, whom many of us thought were tired out and probably dissatisfied because of a player shortage, rebounded with a bang last night to subdue the highly regarded Glace Bay Miners. It could be the same old story of the League leaders taking it easy in January. The Beavers did it two years ago and the Atlantics did it last year. This pattern has become quite noticeable in the M.M.L. during the past three years. The strongest team builds up a big lead before the first of the calendar year. They loaf in January and then pick up in February so as to be in top physical condition by the time the playoffs roll around in mid-March. Last year the Islanders moved to within four points of the Atlantics in January. That was the closest they got. When the schedule ended they were still four points behind.

Harrison Wins Unanimous Decision Over Walls In Rugged 10-Rounder

TORONTO, (CP)—Tommy Harrison of Los Angeles hammered out an unanimous decision over Canadian champion Earl Walls in a bruising 10-round heavyweight boxing bout here Tuesday night before a crowd of 14,737 who paid a record-breaking \$45,201 to see the battle.

Harrison, ranked as the eighth contender for world champion Rocky Marciano's title by Ring Magazine, knocked Walls to the floor twice for the nine count and had the Canadian bleeding from the nose and left eye at the end.

No. 1 U. S. Tennis Player Humiliated By Australian

SYDNEY, (AP)—Tony Trabert, America's No. 1 tennis player, was humiliated by veteran John Bromwich Tuesday in the second round of the Australian national championships. Australian tennis writers immediately forecast an investigation by the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia.

Bromwich, the 35-year-old, two-timed racket-swinger and former Aussie champion and Davis Cup star, was down 1-6, 1-6 only to come back for a 6-2, 6-3, 6-1 victory in the last three sets.

After the match, Trabert sadly muttered to a friend: "He was too good."

Trabert apparently had control of the situation after two sets. Then he slackened and tried to copy some of Bromwich's fancy shots. Bromwich's accuracy became deadly and in no time the Australian took charge. By the time the fifth set came around, Trabert knew only one thing—that he was beaten.

"Come on, play," the crowd yelled as the puzzled American failed to chase the ball.

After the match Bromwich expressed a surprise that Trabert didn't apply pressure.

A Sydney Morning Herald tennis writer said it is almost certain the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia will discuss the match, and that a report on Trabert may be sent to the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association.

Atlantics Snap Losing Streak With 13-4 Victory Over Glace Bay Miners

HALIFAX, (CP) — Halifax Atlantics snapped a four-game losing streak by walloping Glace Bay Miners 13-4 Tuesday night in a free-wheeling Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The league-leading Atlantics, who had won only two of their last nine games, skated rings around Miners for two periods and then played defensively in the last, when they were outshot 21-12.

It was Miners' first loss in six games.

Bill Ford led Halifax with four goals, and Doug McPhee got three and Bob Bowness and Bill Arcand two each. Jene Leclerc and Ross Watson tallied the others.

Moore Is Still 2-To-1 Favorite In Title Bout With Joey Maxim Tonight

MIAMI, Fla., (AP) — Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, mentally upset by a suit filed by his wife today, still was a 2-to-1 favorite to defeat Joey Maxim for the third time in succession when they clash in the Miami Stadium tonight.

Moore's wife, Alice, filed a separate maintenance suit and circuit Judge George E. Holt granted a temporary injunction to prevent Archie from leaving Florida until the suit is settled. He set bond at \$10,000 and ordered Moore arrested, a formally, until the bond is posted. That matter was expected to be taken care of by promoter W. H. Peoples, Jr., and the co-promoting International Boxing Club.

At the same time Judge Holt granted Mrs. Moore's request for an order restraining Peoples and the IBC from paying Archie any money for the fight pending the outcome of her suit.

Moore's share would approximate \$50,000—largest of his 17-year career—if Peoples' prediction of a 20,000 crowd and \$100,000 gate comes true. Radio and television receipts will add about another \$50,000 to the pot. Moore is to receive 40 per cent and Maxim 20 per cent of the net gate and radio-TV money.

Moody and Edgy
 Even before his wife brought legal action against him, Moore had been moody and edgy. He may have been having difficulty making the 175-pound weight limit for the first time.

The St. Louis born Negro scaled 172 1/2 pounds when he drubbed the 31-year-old Maxim in St. Louis, Dec. 17, 1952, to win the title. He weighed 173 3/4 when he narrowly outpointed the clever Clevelander in their return bout in Ogden, Utah, last June 24. Maxim, incidentally weighed 174 1/2 and 175 for those fights.

The ex-champion said he has been close to the division limit now for two weeks and will weigh about 175 pounds at the noon weigh-in ceremony today.

Maxim, usually a very lack-lustre gym boxer, surprised the experts with his training performance this time. A good many competent observers believe he will outbox the hard-hitting Moore and become the first former light heavyweight champion to regain the title in the ring.

Against the thin-legged, tall Maxim is the fact that he has been out of action since the Ogden affair and has had only three fights in the last 13 months, including the two with Moore. Maxim's record is 79-14-4 with 21 knockouts. He has been stopped only once.

Moore, unbeaten in two years and winner of 15 straight bouts, has a 114-19-5 record. A power puncher with either hand, he has 74 knockouts to his credit. He has been stopped four times.

He hasn't fought since he outpatiented Dognar Martinez in Argentina four months ago but he had been active until then.
