Newfoundland May Miss Out On Grant Slice

CORNER BROOK (CP) — Newfoundland may miss out on a large slice of the federal government's \$5,000,000 grant to foster amateur sport and physical fitness in Canada because of the failure of sports organizations in the province to affiliate with national associations or to form provincial groups.

Howie Meeker, Newfoundland's representative on the 30-member national advisory council on physical fitness, suggested the possibility Thursday while attending Minor Hockey Week ceremonies here.

MONTREAL (CP) — French Canada's all-time best-selling book, Les Insolences du Frere Untel, which in the last 1 1/2 years sold more than 115,000 copies, will appear in English translation next March.

Following its appearance and heavy sale the author became a public figure, known by his pen-name of Frere Untel (Brother So-and-So). Last year his order transferred him to Rome to further his theological studies.
