How to Choose a Cow.

The head should be small and fine, as also the neck, shoulders and bones. The eyelids should be well divided but not wrinkled, with a kind, gentle look out of the eye, which should be prominent. Hips should be broad, hind quarters large, veins showing full, and udder fine and well developed. If the lungs are large, the chest broad, and the skin smooth and silky to the touch, with a satin-like gloss, it betokens a good healthy condition united with a vigorous constitution. The stomach should be large, for therein is the machinery that manufactures milk, and like every other manufacturing establishment, plenty of room is required with capacity for work, for the digestive organs are kept in constant work to keep up the supply. She must have in that large stomach not only the room for milk manufacturing establishment, but storage capacity for large quantities of food and water as material from which to make it. She should always show a desire to drink, as plenty of water is required by good milkers. The udder should reach upward behind for quite a distance, and the veins under the stomach leading from the udder, should be as large as cable. The teats should be even wide apart, and not too stiff to the feel. She should not be expected to fat if she is a good milker, for it is expecting too much to find in a cow beef, and capacity of milking at the same time. The best milkers often look very thin in flesh.
