RACES AT HALIFAX

Islanders Among the Prize-winners.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 13.—The Maritime championships were held here on Saturday. The attendance was 1,100. The entries were poor, but some of the races were well contested.

C. J. McMillan, of Charlottetown, won the quarter mile by one yard, and Smith, of Windsor, the two mile by two yards. Connolly won the hurdles by one inch.

Stephen got put back one yard in the 100 yards dash and lost three yards at the start. Humphrey won by two yards.

Stephen won the 220 yards by ten yards. Humphrey did not start.

Smith won all the bicycle events by brilliant sporting.

McKinnon won the mile run by 150 yards.

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—In Saturday's lacrosse game at Toronto the Shamrocks won 8 to 2. The final match will be played at Montreal next Saturday between the Shamrocks and Capitals in Montreal. The standing of both clubs is the same, and the game will be a most exciting one.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

DUNKIRK, Sept. 10.—The fishing fleet returned here to-day from Iceland and reported that out of 98 boats six foundered during the season, resulting in the drowning of 39 men and boys.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—The secretary of the treasury today held in a letter to the collector of customs at Platt-sburg, N. Y., that stemmed leaf tobacco exported to Canada and then imported into the United States is not a manufactured tobacco within the meaning of the internal revenue law and therefore is not subject to the duty equal to the internal revenue tax of six cents a pound assessed on man-ufactured tobacco. The tobacco will be admitted free of duty.

MONTVIDEO, September 10.—It is announced that peace has been concluded between the government of Uruguay and the Urugayan insurgents through the mediation of Dr. Ramirez, who returns here tonight from the insurgent camp with the conditions of peace.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.—Large quantities of wheat are being delivered at country points, the aggregate yesterday being two hundred thousand bushels, and one hundred and six cars were loaded for ship-ment to Fort William. Prices vary from 74 to 82 cents for No. 1 hard, according to the freight rate. The highest price prevails at the points where the milling com-panies are competing with the exporters.

MOSCOW, Sept. 10.—A congress of high Russian ecclesiastics which is now in ses-sion in Kazan is considering measures to stop the spread of Sectarianism. The congress has decided to ask the Govern-ment to proceed against the adherents of Count Tolstoi, as being dangerous to the church and state. It also voted to pro-hibit the publication of Lutheran books in the Russian language. It was proposed that the children of Sectarians be taken from them and educated in public insti-tutions of the Orthodox faith, but the pro-posal was not adopted, for the reason that there are no such institutions in Russia. One bishop suggested that the property of Sectarians be confiscated by the Govern-ment.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Charles Sayers, upon reaching home last night, became angry and upbraided his wife because supper was not ready. William, the elder son, took the part of his mother, and the father struck the boy on the head with a lighted lamp. Bella, the 29-year-old daughter, attempted to save her brother from her father's violence and she is now dying in St. Elizabeth hospital, frightfully burned. Mrs. Ellen Sayers, the mother, and Burt, a 14-year-old son, attempted to rescue Bella from the flames, and they, too, were taken to the hospital, severely burned. William, the object of his father's wrath, covered with blood and burned also, was the fourth member of the family to be cared for at the hospital, while the father, unhurt, was locked up.

In this matter, too, we feel by many expressions of good will, that we have the hearty co-operation of the outside public. Our interests and advantages we feel to be mutual. It is a worthy project and cannot be a step in the wrong direction. We are sure of a full house.

In a few days will appear the tickets and the handbills containing the printed pro-gramme which the committee will send out with that faith which confidence of success alone can inspire.
