A happy celebration took place at the home of Mr. Dougal Cantelo, Pinette, upon the attainment of his 90th birthday, when his family and friends gathered to offer congratulations and best wishes.

Mr. Cantelo still retains his good health and eye sight, never uses glasses. He has an excellent memory, and can recount much of the past history of the Pinette district.

He made the sea his lifetime occupation making his first voyage, as a boy at the age of thirteen on the Brigantine, "Lottie Belle" bound for New York with a cargo of potatoes.

Owing to stormy weather this trip took 48 days, gales blowing them off course and out to sea.

After unloading at New York a general cargo was loaded for Brazil from where they returned to New York with a cargo of raw sugar.

Eventually returning to Pinette, he married Miss Catherine MacDonald, a neighbour, November 8, 1892, and became engaged in lobster fishing which occupation he carried on until his retirement at the age of seventy.

There were five daughters from his marriage, Effie, Mrs. S. Compton, deceased, Catherine, Mrs. G.E. Young, Belle River, Florence, Mrs. Dr. McCarthy, New Jersey, U.S.A., Mary Etta, Mrs. H. Cantelo, Eldon, and Nelsena, Mrs. E. W. Smith, Pinette.

His wife passed away April 10, 1951, Mr. Cantelo, known to all as Dougal, is a grand old man beloved by all who know him.

The president, Miss Noreen Shaw, in her opening remarks welcomed Sister Marie Monica as new Sister Councillor to replace Sister Mary Stanislaus. She also welcomed some of the new Graduate Nurses and invited them to join the Guild.

The minutes of the last meeting and executive meeting also the correspondence was read by the secretary Mrs. Betty Carragher. In the absence of the treasurer, the financial report was given by Mrs. Mary Maddigan.

In her report of the executive meeting of the Maritime Council of Catholic Nurses which was held in Antigonish Miss Eileen Connolly informed us that Mrs. R. S. MacDonald had been appointed as delegate from the M. C. C. N. to attend a meeting of the Catholic Nurses Association of Canada in Ottawa on June 22.

Then Mrs. MacDonald informed the meeting that it is the wish of The Holy Father that all Catholic Nurses' Organizations in Canada join the C. N. A. C. to have a representation in the World Health Organization.

The Ways and means committee decided to meet later to discuss means of raising funds. The membership committee will try to get as many Catholic nurses as possible to join and thereby increase membership in the Guild.

A motion was put through the meeting to the effect that the St. Veronica's Guild make a donation of \$25.00 to the M. C. C. N. to help send a delegate to the annual meeting of C. N. A. C.

A nominating committee of three was appointed by the president for the annual meeting in which she suggested holding in September following the M.C.C.N. Convention, and thus omit the August meeting.

Miss Noreen Shaw was appointed as delegate and Mrs. Martha MacIsaac as alternate delegate to the M. C. C. N. Convention to be held in Sydney in September.
