# Hospital Insurance Will Be Debated Here Today

Inclusion of mental and tuberculosis patients in any comprehensive plan of Hospital Insurance submitted by the federal government was requested in a resolution introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. M. L. Bonnell, Minister of Health.

The resolution also asks the federal government to include in any proposed scheme a provision whereby it will share administrative costs of the plan as well as depreciation and interest charges on any capital costs resulting from its implementation; to allow 100 per cent differential between ward rates and private and semi-private rates; and to continue to assume the responsibility for the

care of Indians, Eskimos, sick mariners, War Veterans allowances, and immigrants.

**DISCUSSION HELD OVER**  
At the suggestion of House Leader Matheson, the Opposition members were given the option of deferring discussion of the resolution until today.

The Premier noted that the resolution had been tabled on March 20 and that the Opposition members might not have had a chance to study it. (March 20 was the afternoon on which the House was suddenly adjourned by the Premier.)

Dr. Dewar, replying for the Opposition, stated that he would be happy to have the opportunity to study the resolution for a day.

In the preamble to the resolution it is noted that the Prime Minister, at the Dominion-Provincial Conference last November, had offered to include care of mental patients and tuberculosis cases in comprehensive Hospital Insurance plan, but the original plan was offered the Provinces by the Government of Canada in January, 1957, had contained no such provision.

The preamble to the resolution also noted that the original scheme called for an allowance to hospitals of only 40 per cent of the differential between ward and semi-private and private care, and had no provision for showing administrative or capital costs.
