

Local and Other Items.

PERSONAL.—Mr. W. C. Desbriay, of the Summerside Journal, is at the Rankin.

THE ELECTION.—The count of the ballots shows that the Scott Act has been sustained by a majority of 19.

HOLIDAY.—Mr. F. Greehan, the popular agent of the P. E. I. Railway at Cardigan, has gone on his vacation, his place being filled by Mr. P. C. Murphy.

A HORSESHOE RECORD.—Mr. Charles Metcalf, of Lutes Mountain, on Saturday the 12th inst., shod 20 horses in 104 hours, and on Monday shod 20 horses in 10 hours without a helper. When any one man beats this, Mr. Metcalf will try again.—Moncton Times.

HIS HEAD CUT OFF.—Mazaire Letaigne, a Frenchman, was present at the opening of the Carquet Railway, last Saturday, and while stepping from one car to another fell between them, the wheels passing over his head, severing it from the body. Death was instantaneous.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS.—The Stations of the Cross for the new Roman Catholic Church at St. Peter's Bay, are being framed by Mr. John Newson. Several have been completed and are now on exhibition in Mr. Newson's show window. They are handsome, and are much admired.

SCOTT ACT.—Of the fifteen cases occupying the attention of the Stipendiary Magistrate as we went to press yesterday afternoon two convictions—one a first and the other a second offence—were secured, and the remainder were postponed, one until Friday and the others until Tuesday next.

CRIMINAL LIBEL.—One result of the failure of the Central Bank, Toronto, is actions for criminal libel instituted by the Jacques Cartier and Hochelaga banks against the French trade paper which stated that those banks had tried to cheat the public by circulating Central bills. The truth is that they only accepted them for collection.

COMING THIS WAY.—Rev. Garrobed Nergeryan, Presbyterian minister, of Constantinople will be in Pictou, en route for P. E. I. on Friday, and on the evening of that day will address a meeting in St. Andrew's church. He will appear in his native costume and sing in his native tongue. He is a most interesting man. The collection at the close is to assist him in his work.—Pictou Standard.

CARDIGAN SHIPPING.—The following schrs. are loading at Cardigan Bridge this week with potatoes, viz.:—Geraldine, Galaxy, Jubilee, Energy, Cardigan, Titmouse, and Georgina. These vessels have a carrying capacity of about 25,000 bushels, but no difficulty will be experienced in obtaining their cargoes, as Cardigan Bridge is one of the principal shipping ports in King's County. Prices continue steady as follows:—Whites and Roses, 30c.; McIntyres, 25c. to 25c., oats, 26c. to 27c.

LAST NIGHT'S RALLY.—The Scott Act meeting in the Lyceum last evening was largely attended. Mayor Haviland presided. The speakers were Hon. Mr. Bentley, Rev. Messrs. Hogg and Crisp, of Moncton, Rev. Mr. Cahill, of Summerside, Rev. Messrs. Carruthers and Whitman, of Charlottetown, and the Chairman. The addresses were chiefly on the evils of the liquor traffic, and invariably closed with reference to the importance of the issue, and the duty of the hour. The proceedings were opened and closed with prayer.

TRUSTED AND BUSTED.—A covered wagon, drawn by a pair of somewhat weary looking horses, crossed the ferry to Windsor, Ont., one day last week. Upon the side was a rudely painted legend: "In Dakota we trusted; in Dakota we busted." Within were John Ainslie, an intelligent farmer, his wife and six children, who have been drawn from Douglas county, Dakota, a distance of over 1,000 miles, to Garfield, Essex county, Ontario, their former home. In spite of their long journey, all looked clean, comfortable, and in good health.

A DARING ROBBERY.—The daring robbery of about \$500, part of money received for a cargo of potatoes from Capt. Keeping, of the schooner Julia Ward, lying at Mill Cove, is reported from Dartmouth. It is supposed that on Monday night while the captain slept the robber by some means obtained entrance to the cabin of the vessel, and by the use of a drug made of the keeper inaccessible until after the vessel had been committed. A man named Publicover was arrested yesterday on suspicion, but was discharged for lack of sufficient evidence. The robber is still at large.—Hc. Herald.

THE WORST FOR FORTY YEARS.—A recent despatch from Portland, Me., says: "Fishermen say that this has been the poorest season for 40 years for the Portland mackerel fleet, less than 10,000 barrels having been packed, and not more than a dozen of the fleet of 60 vessels have paid their bills, and but four or five have made any profit. The schr. Lizzie Maud has stocked nearly \$13,000. The steamer Novelty has also made a profit. The schr. Ethel, having combined codfishing with mackereling, has stocked the most money of any fisherman out of the port. Several vessels are fitting for winter fishing."

HYMENEA.—Mr. Isaac Carter (of George Carter & Co.) and Miss Isabella Cantley, were united in marriage at the residence of Mrs. Sinclair, Fitzroy Street, last evening. Mr. A. E. Crosby acted as groomsman and Miss Annie Carter as bridesmaid. The nuptial knot was tied by Rev. J. M. McLeod. A similar ceremony was performed last evening about the same hour at the residence of Mr. W. H. Batt, Water Street, when Mr. Jefferson D. Gardiner and Miss Jane Batt were bound in hymen's fetters by Rev. S. Weston-Jones. Miss Maud Batt was the bridesmaid and Mr. R. Macdonald the groomsman. To all the high-contracting parties we extend our congratulations.

THE TURF.—The fastest yearling trotter yet produced is the filly called Norlaine, which placed the mark at 2.31½ at San Francisco on the 12th inst. She was got by Norval, a son of Electioneer. Her dam Elaine, made a record of 2.28 as a three-year-old. She is by Messenger Duroc, out of Green Mountain Maid. The dam of Norval was Norma, which has a record of 2.33½, and was also the dam of Lucy Cuyler, which was driven a mile to road wagon by Robert Bonner in 2.15½. Wildflower, by Electioneer, fastest two-year-old record, 2.21; Sable Wilkes by Guy Wilkes, fastest three-year-old record, 2.18; Manzanita by Electioneer, fastest four-year-old record, 2.19—were all bred in California. Frank Van Ness, the driver of Rosaline Wilkes, 2.18½, has offered to match her against Kenilwood for \$1,000 a side, the race to be trotted any good day this month.

Local and Other Items.

THE ELECTION.—The Scott Act election is going on quietly to-day. There is no drunkenness visible, prohibition appearing to be universal.

REPRESENTATIONS.—Mrs. Leonard's lecture this evening will be illustrated with various representations of temples, pagodas, great sleeping idols and other remarkable views of Siamese life.

SCHOOL OF ART.—Mrs. Leonard's lecture to-night is in behalf of the School of Art and Design, Halifax, where already over 100 mechanics attend the free evening classes, although on any opened last month.

A POPULAR RESORT.—The Prohibitionists have organized a National Camp Ground Association and secured twenty-five acres of grove land on Staten Island, which they intend to turn into a popular resort for lovers of the cause.

DISEASE IN MONCTON.—The Times reports that typhoid fever has been more or less prevalent in Moncton all summer and that there are just now a good many cases of diphtheria. It thinks that cess pools, sewer gas and bad ventilation are the chief causes.

BROKE HIS ARM.—A Port Hawkesbury despatch says: "The mate, DeCoste, of the schooner Elizabeth Ann, which arrived here Sunday from P. E. Island bound to Boston, while engaged with some of the crew turning a boat on shore had his arm broken."—Halifax Chronicle.

BANQUETTED.—Prof. Sumichrast and Mr. H. C. McLeod, ex-Inspector of the Bank of Nova Scotia, were banquetted at the Halifax Hotel, Halifax, on Tuesday evening. The table was well spread and an enjoyable evening was spent. Prof. Sumichrast goes to Boston, and Mr. McLeod, who is a P. E. Islander, to Minneapolis, to take charge of the Bank of Nova Scotia agency there.

TAKING INSURANCE AGENCIES.—An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Herald says:—The cases of the Ocean, Mutual, and other insurance companies against the corporation of Halifax, brought to decide whether the corporation had any legal right to tax branch offices as insurance companies, have been removed from the Supreme Court docket. Three times the hearing of the cases was laid over, pending the decision of the Privy Council in a Quebec case. Judgment having been rendered in favor of the Quebec corporation, the Halifax cases were withdrawn.

COUNTERFEITERS CAPTURED.—For several weeks past Sarnia, Ont., has been flooded with counterfeit dollars and cents. No clue was obtained as to the guilty parties until Monday last when the Sheriff and his deputies drove to the residence of a man named John Mack and searched his house, where they found plaster paris moulds, one hundred bogus dollars, some coin partly finished and other paraphernalia. Mack and wife were arrested, and a search of the house of T. W. Ernest, about a mile distant, was made, when a similar discovery was made. Ernest, his wife, and the latter's sister, were also arrested.

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—Mr. John McLellan, architect, who died at Sydney, C. B., on the 13th inst., was a native of P. E. Island. At the time of his death Mr. McLellan was in his 68th year. The Antigonish Casket says: "When quite a young man, some forty years ago, he built the Churches of Ponquette and Croisniah in this diocese. Afterwards he went to the United States, where he worked for many years, and while there took instructions under Kelly, the celebrated American Architect. Then he returned to his native Island, where for fifteen years without intermission he worked for Bishop McIntyre, during which time he built or finished some of the finest churches in the diocese of Charlottetown. Among others the churches of Lot 11 and St. Andrew's were built by Mr. McLellan; so, too, were St. Joseph's Convent, Charlottetown and many other buildings of the same kind in different parts of the Island. It was he who finished the interior of the magnificent church at Tignish, after which he built and finished the large and beautiful Convent and Glebe House of that parish."

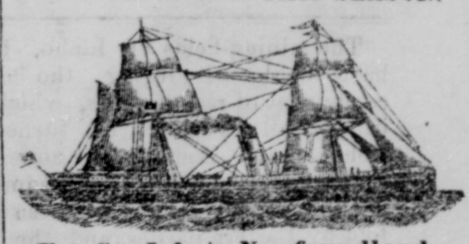
