



Latest from Europe! News by the Cable! Latest from the United States Treaty between Prussia and Saxony ratified.

Fenian Prisoners now being tried. Berlin, Oct. 26. Treaty between Prussia and Saxony has been fully ratified.

Paris, Oct. 25. Rumors are current that changes in the French Cabinet are imminent.

Toronto, Oct. 25. By the trial of the Fenians to-day, Colonel Lynch was found guilty and sentenced to be hung on the 13th December next.

New York, Oct. 24. A fire in Nashville, Tenn., this morning, destroyed property to the value of one million dollars.

New Orleans, Oct. 23. Several buildings on Fulton and Front Levee streets, occupied mostly by wholesale grocers, were destroyed by fire this morning.

Quebec, Oct. 23. The Grand Trunk Railway carry free all contributions for the Quebec sufferers by the great fire.

Toronto 24, P. M. The trial of the Fenian Prisoners taken at Fort Erie in June last, commenced at noon to-day.

New York, Oct. 23. A Toronto special despatch says despatches are coming from all parts of the Provinces demanding that no mercy be shown to the convicted Fenians.

The threats made by the New York Fenians to avenge the deaths of those convicted are doing great injury to the prisoners.

Petitions are to be circulated and sent to the Governor General to forward, to have the sentence commuted to imprisonment.

David Whalen, Patrick Norton and Dan Drummond have been arraigned.

Fears are entertained that the prisoners may escape.

There are in this city over five hundred unemployed Irish Americans.

The Fenian prisoners at Cornwall are to be indicted on Monday, for high treason and tried the following Wednesday.

President Johnson has interposed offices of Government in behalf of convicted Fenians in Canada, and has expressed hope that Her Majesty's Government will exercise toward them mercy and forgiveness.

Gold 146 1-9. New York, Oct. 29. Fifty thousand people assembled at Jones' Wood yesterday, to hear Stephens last speech in America.

He said he would return to Ireland, where he would strike a blow for Ireland before the dawning of the New Year.

An army of 50,000 was organized there who reject the political dictation of the Catholic clergy.

He urged the same disposition upon his audience, but counselled them to respect them in all that pertains to their special calling as spiritual advisers.

A man in the crowd, supposed to be a British spy, was beaten almost to death, but after the row was over he was proved innocent of such a charge.

At the meeting of the Fenian Circles last night, it was resolved to avenge the death of the convicted Fenians in Canada, and they dared the Canadians to execute them.

The Herald's Toronto special says the guard over the Fenian prisoners has been doubled.

The threats by the Fenians in the United States are having a bad effect upon the treatment of the prisoners who now suffer from the want of clothing.

Large Fenian meetings were held in Chicago and Buffalo yesterday, denouncing the Canadian Government, and threatening retaliation.

The Democratic State Central Committee have passed a resolution, requesting the President to interfere in behalf of the convicted Fenians in Canada.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 29th. An enthusiastic mass meeting of Fenians was held on Saturday night in St. James' Hall, at which retaliation upon Canada was resolved upon, by Lynch and McMahon was executed.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 28th. A meeting of Fenians is called for Tuesday night, to consider action relative to the recent actions in Canada.

LONDON, Oct. 27. It was said that the relations between Austria and Russia are assuming a menacing character.

PARIS, Oct. 25. The project submitted by France and England to the Spanish Government for the settlement of the Chilian difficulty, has been approved of by the Queen and Ministers.

FLORENCE, Oct. 28. An arrival from Candia states that a great battle took place on 17th inst. The Greeks took that the Turkish army was repulsed.
