Statement From Mr. D. L. Mathieson On Party Leadership

Interest is being aroused in the question of the Provincial leadership for the Progressive Conservative Party in succession to Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, which is one of the matters to be decided at the Party convention to be held here on Thursday night.

"I have been asked to offer myself as a candidate at the Convention called for the election of a Provincial leader of the Progressive Conservative Party.

"I have at least sufficient public opinion and training in political affairs to realize what is expected of the leader of this great Party and the responsibilities of the office. Therefore if the representatives of the people should honour me with the appointment I undertake to do my best to fit myself for the task.

"The position will be all the more difficult for my new man to fill due to the high character, the outstanding ability and the driving force of our retiring leader, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. Whoever succeeds him will do well if he can follow the Doctor's example by upholding his high standards of conduct in the public service.

"The policies I would advocate are those necessary to overcome our handicaps of inadequate revenues for Provincial Government services, exorbitant transportation costs and retarded industrial development for the utilization of natural products.

"I am against Government control of business and industry. I detest the concentration of authority in the hands of a few men of the Executive Council and its employees, but I am in favour of any necessary public assistance to enterprises which will increase the prosperity of our farmers, fishermen and labourers; that is to say, the prosperity of all our citizens."

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To The Conservative Electors of Prince Edward Island

I have been requested by numerous electors to allow my name to go up for nomination for Party Leadership at the Provincial Convention on June 29th next and have consented to do so.

At this time I desire to introduce myself to you and to place before you my qualifications and record with the Conservative Party. Since the 1917 election I have been an active organizer and worker in every election and a candidate for Second Queen's in the past three general provincial elections. In 1939 I was asked to run in the strong Liberal district of Second Queen's on the Councillor ballot. In 1935 election the Liberal candidate, and my opponent in 1939, had a majority of some three hundred and forty-five votes on the property ballot. In 1939 I cut that majority to nothing and have never been beaten in a general election since. Despite the fact that a Liberal Government was strongly returned in the past three general elections, I have increased my majority in each election and Second Queen's is, after a great many years, a Conservative riding, being the only rural riding to return two Conservative candidates in the past two elections.

I was born on a farm forty-eight years ago and have always been interested in agriculture. As representing one of the leading agricultural districts in the Province, and to better acquaint myself with the farmers' problems, some four years ago, I actively engaged in farming operations, and, in addition to my legal business at Charlottetown, am now personally operating over two hundred acres of land at New Glasgow and Mayfield and where I reside with my wife and two children six months of the year. I have been raising Shorthorn cattle for the past eight years, now having a herd of forty head. I am a member of the Farmers Federation, the Shorthorn Breeders Association, and Swine Breeders Association.

I have resided in Charlottetown for over thirty years and have always taken an interest in all matters dealing with Civic affairs and improvements. I have been a member of the Board of Trade for over twenty years and was its President in 1937.

With the above experience with all classes of our people, I humbly feel that I have some qualifications for the difficult and onerous position that is to be the lot of some one on June 29th. I feel that the time is ripe for a vigorous and fighting Conservative Campaign and I, for one, whether the leader or not, will do my part to aid in the return of sound Government to this Province under Conservative rule.

Death Sunday Of Well Known Island Priest

One of the Island's oldest priests, Rev. John A. Gaudet, passed away yesterday afternoon at the Sacred Heart Home after an illness of nearly a year and a half. He was 78 years of age.

Ordained to the priesthood in 1904, Father Gaudet served as pastor of St. Ignace, Hope River, Bloomfield and Egnont Bay parishes before he retired in 1945. During the past five years he has been at the Sacred Heart Home.

He was born in Tignish on July 3, 1871, the son of Arcade Gaudet and Mary Madeline Chaisson. He received his early education in Tignish and later attended St. Dunstan's University and the Grand Seminary, Quebec.
