Fire Department Gets Radio Unit

MONTAGUE — A two-way radio unit enabling firemen to contact headquarters in Montague at all times will be purchased by the Montague fire brigade.

The unit is considered necessary for out of town fires in the event of an emergency requiring doctors and police, breakdowns or other fire emergencies.

The unit will also make it possible to have immediate contact between the pump at the water source and a fire.

Reporting on the out of town calls, Chief Coffin advised that only 57 of the 120 home units in the Montague district had taken advantage of the service. He stated that he hoped that the remainder understood, no payment, no protection from the brigade.

Canoe Cove Man Fined \$40 For Three Related Charges

SUMMERSIDE — Harland Gordon Gass of Canoe Cove was fined a total of \$40 plus costs in Prince County Court yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

The accused was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to yield the right of way at intersection; \$20 and costs for driving a vehicle not properly equipped and \$10 and costs for operating a vehicle without a valid driver's license.

The charges were laid as a result of an accident at Tryon which occurred when the accused's vehicle went through an intersection, colliding with another car.

Arthur Alan MacDonald, 17, of Shamrock was fined \$10 and costs for speeding and a similar amount for passing on a solid line.

Also fined \$10 and costs for speeding were James Francis Hughes, Shamrock, and Claude Joseph Goodwin of Wellington.

A Port Hill man, Clayton Charles Noye, entered a not guilty plea to a charge of impaired driving and his case was adjourned for one week for a trial date to be set. The accused was represented by J. Melville Campbell.

Joseph Basil Whalen of Tignish, pleaded not guilty to care and control while impaired and his case was adjourned to Tuesday, June 22. Whalen was representing the national general landscaping of the whole district.

John Arthur Decoste of Margate was given a reprimand when he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without a license.

Long-Time Lodge Member Herbert Clark Dies At 83

ALBERTON — The death of Herbert Clark occurred in the Western Hospital Monday afternoon following a brief illness.

He was born in Alberton 83 years ago, the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Clark, and was a life-long resident of the town.

He served the community for 25 years as postmaster and after retirement was engaged in fox farming for a time. He was an expert gardener and much of his time in recent years has been devoted to this hobby from which he derived much pleasure.

For almost 60 years he has been a member of Zetland Lodge.

AF and AM, having joined July 5, 1905. Ten years ago he received his 50-year jewel. He was a past master of the lodge and for a great many years had served as its secretary.

Some years ago he carefully assembled all records of Zetland Lodge from the time of its organization in 1867 and placed them in safekeeping. At one time when membership in the lodge had become low because of removal by death of many older members, it was mainly through the activity of Mr. Clark and the late W. C. Leavitt that the interest of a number of young men was kindled and encouraged. Thus the lodge in Alberton recovered its strength.

He was a long-time member of the church, first of the Presbyterian and after 1925 of the United Church in which he served on the committee of stewards in Alberton congregation.

For many years Mr. Clark has been handicapped by an almost complete loss of hearing.

In 1922 he was married to the former Emma Champion. She predeceased him 16 years ago. He is survived by three brothers, Fred, Arthur and Howard, all of Alberton. Erskine Clark of Alberton and John K. Clark of Charlottetown are nephews.
