Communities Merged Work Together

TYNE VALLEY — The petty jealousies and mutual rivalries of so many communities today must be overcome if growth and progress are to take place. Rev. David Macdonald told a meeting of the West Prince Board of Trade Wednesday night, "and the answer to the problem lies with the people themselves."

Addressing about 75 people following a dinner at the Tyne Valley Hall, Mr. Macdonald said: "It seems that as soon as one community finds success with a project selected by night-borne communities with the feeling that they are trying to 'put something over on us'."

"We must learn to work together to progress. Continuing as we are now can only lead to more problems," he said. "No one else is going to solve our problems for us; we must do ourselves, and we must do it together."

Mr. Macdonald also felt that people today depend too much on the government for help. He called it damaging to a society "which has become somewhat sick" because it defies the will to work.
