A MAN named Redd, of Brackley Point had his leg broken yesterday evening. While driving his team on St. Peter's road, the axle of the cart broke, and the vehicle fell upon him. Dr. Jenkins was summoned and set the broken limb.

THE authorities in Quebec, have received letters from cavalry officers in England, inquiring what is the prospect for buying a suitable remount of horses for the English cavalry, in Canada, and what they would cost delivered at Quebec.

THE barque Lucy Pope, Capt. McDonald, arrived at Bas Verte, near Bristol, last night, to load deal. Mr. William Davis, son of J. J. Davis, Esq., of the Rankin, and Mr. J. DeBlois, son of Hon. G. W. DeBlois, were passengers by her.

THE barn of Neil McKelvie, Esq., Summerside, was destroyed by fire yesterday at two o'clock, together with its contents of carriages, sleighs, hay and oats. Mr. McKelvie had no insurance on the property. The cause of the fire is unknown.

We understand that the case of the Dominion Government vs. the Liquidators of the Bank of P. E. Island will be heard before Judge Peters on Monday. The most important question to be decided in the suit is whether the Queen has a right to payment in full.

THE CONVENT DE NOTRE DAME and St. Joseph's Convent, Cornwall Street, opens on Monday. It is desirable at the opening, to have a full attendance of pupils, in order that the classes may at once be organized. Therefore, pupils should attend punctually on Monday morning.

THE sickening smell arising from a quantity of rotten herring at Lord's Wharf has been an annoyance to the residents of Queen Street and vicinity for the past week; but we are pleased to see that the civic authorities have to-day taken steps to abate the nuisance. The herring have been removed for fertilizing purposes, and the part of the wharf where they lay will be covered with lime.

THE Windsor correspondent of the St. John Sun says: "The weather for some time was exceedingly warm, but has taken a sudden change. On Sunday, 24th instant, the mercury stood at 82° and the next day at 82°. The sudden change strongly reminds one of the Halifax Chronicle in the late P. E. Island election, with the important difference that the weather is more honest than the Chronicle."

IN our article reviewing the P. E. Island Exhibition Prize List yesterday, we inadvertently omitted to note the fact that Mr. F. T. Newbury offers a special prize of \$5 for the best sample of fodder corn; and that Mr. Robert Smallwood will give \$25 in prizes for shingles cut by single machines of his own manufacture. Gentlemen interested in other manufactures would do well to offer similar encouragement.

THE TREF.—Six thousand people visited Prospect Park, New York, on the 28th, to witness the attempt of Phalias and Jay Eye See to beat records of 2.13 and 2.09 respectively. Phalias was given three trials, resulting as follows: 2.18, 2.20, 2.17. Jay Eye See made two attempts, scoring his miles in 2.12 and 2.14. Both, who drove both horses, stated that the failure to reach or lower the records was due to the strong wind which was blowing, and to the cuppy track.

AN unfortunate creature who gives his name as Charles Cahil and hails from Prince Edward Island, has been a nuisance at the Moncton station for some time. He is in the habit of entering houses and asking for food, but has done no harm. Last evening he was taken in charge by I. C. R. officer O'Rourke and placed in the lockup for safe keeping. It is likely he will be furnished with a ticket and forwarded to some other locality. The trouble is that he seems to like Moncton and will not say where he desires to be sent.—Moncton Times.

CATTLE SHIPMENT.—Messrs Patrick Trainor and Geo. Mutch shipped by the brig King Bird, which sailed for St. John's, Newfoundland, to-day, twenty eight head of cattle, forty sheep, a ton of oatmeal, thirty-one tubs of butter and two pigs. Among the cattle were three fine thoroughbred heifers, selected by Messrs. Trainor and Mutch for a stock farm in Newfoundland. One was raised by Mr. Patrick Duffy, another by Mr. George Mason, and the other by Mrs. Lane. They are magnificent animals, have a certificate of pedigree from the Live Stock Inspector, and will be a valuable addition to the live stock of Newfoundland.

Terrible Storm in the Northwest.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 29. A severe storm visited Manitoba on Wednesday night. Rain fell in torrents. The lightning was vivid. Several houses were blown down, sidewalks torn up, and fronts of houses blown out. Lightning damaged the Hudson Bay Company's storehouses to the extent of \$10,000.

Terrible Burning.

DENVER, COL., Aug. 29. A despatch from Greeley gives a sickening account of the burning of a circus car, a dozen or more of the passengers having been burned alive. Others escaped terribly injured. The number fatally burned will probably reach twenty.

China Peaceably Inclined.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29. The report is that China is desirous of coming to an agreement with France. The European residents of Shanghai remain unmolested.

Courbet's Triumph.

PARIS, Aug. 29. The press is exultant over the successes which have attended Admiral Courbet's efforts in destroying the defenses along the River Mui, between Foo Chow and the sea.

Royalty in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Aug. 29. The Duke of Edinburgh, with the Channel fleet is visiting Dublin. He has been well received, thousands of persons flocked to visit the fleet.

Another Cyclone.

HURON, Dak., Aug. 29. A small cyclone passed east of this place yesterday, destroying everything in its path.

PARIS, Aug. 29. Gen. Millet telegraphs that the Chinese are making preparation to invade Tonquin.

The Meeting of Presbytery.

THE Presbytery of P. E. Island met according to appointment in Lots 16 and 14, on the 26th inst.; in Lot 11 and Egmont Bay, on the 27th; and in Tyne Valley, on the 28th inst. There were present Rev. Alexander Sterling, Neil McKay, J. McLeod, Wm. P. Archibald, Arthur F. Carr, George McMillan, Wm. A. Mason, and Roderick McLean, ruling elder. These meetings of Presbytery were held in response to a request from the congregation of Richmond Bay with a view to the division of the congregation into two distinct charges. At Lot 16 a resolution was passed to the effect that if the other sections concurred in the arrangement, they would consent to the organization of Lots 14 and 16 into a distinct and separate charge. At Lot 14 the following resolution was adopted, viz: "This meeting being of the opinion that on account of the extent of the congregation of Richmond Bay and the large number of preaching stations therein, it is impossible for any one minister to perform the pastoral duties involved, would earnestly request Presbytery, the other sections concurring, to disjoin Lots 16 and 14 from Tyne Valley Egmont Bay, and Lot 11, and form them into a new congregation. Those who were present at the Lot 11 meeting expressed themselves willing, provided Tyne Valley and Egmont Bay concurred, to be organized with these two stations into a distinct and separate charge. At Egmont Bay and at Tyne Valley the following resolution was unanimously adopted, viz: "This meeting being fully persuaded that the congregation of Richmond Bay as at present constituted is too large, and that a division is necessary, express their approval of the plan proposed re the formation of Lots 14 and 16 into one congregation, and of Tyne Valley, Lot 11 and Egmont Bay into another congregation, and earnestly request Presbytery to give effect to the proposed division of the congregation."

Wherefore, the Presbytery, after mature deliberation, unanimously agreed to grant the request of the congregation, and the moderator declared Lots 14 and 16 to be a distinct and separate charge, to be known as the congregation of Richmond Bay East; and that the acting elders in these two sections, with Rev. N. McKay as their interim moderator, shall constitute the session thereof. He also declared Tyne Valley, Lot 11, and Egmont Bay to be a separate and distinct congregation, to be known as Richmond Bay West, and that the acting elders in these three sections, with Rev. A. F. Carr as their interim moderator, shall constitute the session thereof. Rev. Charles Fraser was appointed to supply Richmond Bay East till next meeting of Presbytery, and Mr. Currie, Richmond Bay West, till the end of September. Elders' commissions were read and sustained from Malpeque, Beledue, and

Georgetown and Montague, appointing Messrs. James Ramsay, James Carruthers and Duncan Fraser, respectively, to represent them in Presbytery and Synod during the ensuing year.

A very cordial and harmonious call was sustained from the congregation of George town and Montague, to Mr. W. H. Spencer, and the clerk instructed to forward it to him for his decision.

Moderation in a call was granted to the congregation of Tignish, Montrose and Elmsdale; and Rev. J. M. McLeod appointed to preach in Montrose on 8th September, at ten o'clock, and moderate in said call.

Rev. A. B. McLeod declined the call from Strath Lorne, Cape Breton. In setting the call aside, the Presbytery expressed their cordial concurrence in Mr. McLeod's decision, and their sympathy with the congregation of Strath Lorne in their disappointment. The congregation of West Cape, &c., is warmly attached to their pastor. His labors have been greatly blessed during the past year, more than fifty having been added to the communion roll by a profession of faith in Christ, and the decision of their pastor, cannot but be gratifying to them in the highest degree.

The clerk was instructed to certify Mr. William Leslie Clay to McGill College, Montreal.

It was agreed to hold a meeting of Presbytery in Malpeque, on 16th September, at 11 o'clock, for the purpose of dealing with calls before Presbytery.
