TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 19.

In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Charlton moved for a return respecting the timber limits granted by the Government since the first of March, 1885.

Taylor's bill respecting the importation of alien labor was read a second time, on a division, it being understood that the House did not thereby admit its principle. It was thus referred to a special committee to report upon the operation of the clauses which have given rise to the bill and to suggest the best means for removing these causes.

Mr. Casgrain's bill to provide a further oath to secure the independence of Parliament, was read a second time and referred to the Committee of Privileges and Elections.

Mr. Charlton moved the second reading of the bill to prevent the Government from influencing elections by means of grants for public works. Sir John Macdonald said the bill was an insult to the Government, and utterly nonsensical. He moved the six months' hoist. The House divided on Sir John's motion, which was carried by 108 to 61. House adjourned at 10.35.

The Orange bill was read a second time in the Senate this afternoon, and referred to the banking committee on a vote of 32 to 20. One Catholic Conservative (McMillan) voted for the bill, and two Protestant Liberals (Haythorne and Lewin) voted against it.

The privileges and elections committee met to-day to consider the Rykert matter. It was agreed that Rykert should have witnesses and documents ready by Friday, when the next meeting will be held.

The committee appointed to investigate the charges against Sir Fred. Middleton and Hyter Reed met this afternoon. Lister formulated the charges against Middleton briefly as follows: That certain furs belonging to Bremner were by order of Middleton taken possession of, and subsequently by order of Reed sent to the warden of Battledieu, who had two bales addressed to Middleton, one to Bedson, one to Reed, and shipped by boat to Winnipeg. It is further charged that the furs and horses taken at Batoche were appropriated by Middleton. Bedson appropriated the pool table. The horses were taken from the settlers at Batoche. McDonald, of Battledieu, gave evidence. He said he saw those boxes addressed to Middleton. He valued Bremner's furs at five thousand dollars. He had given the information to Lister. The committee decided to summon a lot of witnesses from the Northwest before the next meeting.

TERRIFIC GALE.

Fears for the Shipping.

CHATHAM, Mass., March 19.
A terrific northeast gale, with blinding snow, came on suddenly this morning. A dozen schooners were outside, bound south, and fears are entertained for their safety, as it became very thick so suddenly that it would be very difficult to find their way over the shoals to an anchorage.

COHASSET, Mass., Mar. 19.
The storm here was the most severe of the winter. It commenced snowing at 9 o'clock this morning and continued with increasing severity ever since. The storm shows no signs of abatement.

Failure in New York.

NEW YORK, March 19.
The well-known house of John F. Plummer & Co. made an assignment to-day to Jeremiah P. Murphy, cashier and bookkeeper, giving a preference of \$2,000 to Everts, Choate & Beaman. The liabilities are said to be \$100,000. Murphy says the assets are about the same amount. Nominally the firm did business of over \$35,000,000 a year, and was the largest commission house in the business.

Unrestricted Reciprocity.

WINNIPEG, March 19.
In the local legislature, yesterday, Attorney-General Martin gave notice that he would introduce a resolution to petition parliament, praying that steps be taken to secure unrestricted reciprocity with the United States.

The New Chancellor.

BERLIN, March 19.
General Von Caprivi, commander of the tenth army corps, has been appointed chancellor of the empire, to succeed Bismarck.

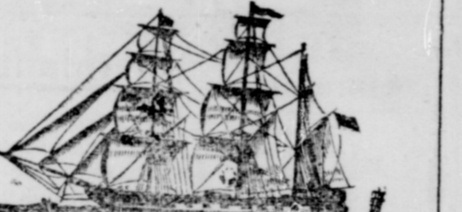
