ISLAND ODDS AND ENDS
More and more the Town of Souris is assuming greater importance as a provincial business centre, especially in relation to the fishing industry. In recognition of the towns possibilities, its port facilities are to be improved by the Dominion Government to the extent of almost one million dollars. Ambitious plans have been discussed for some months to capitalize on Souris' close proximity to one of the finest fishing grounds in the world, and it could well be that our Federal Government is well aware of the wealth that lies off our shores, a few miles from Souris.

It is altogether likely too that defence authorities see the value of Souris harbour as a revictualing point for submarine craft in the event of war. Traffic through the Gulf of St. Lawrence could very well be protected by small ships based on Souris. It is understood that the close to a million dollar outlay will include dredging as well as wharf improvements.

Now that the Provincial Government is carrying out a campaign stressing the value of woodlots to our several thousand farmers, some far-seeing agricultural leaders look forward to the day when an annual revenue will be received from the cultivated woodlots on Island farms. Padre's Visit Recalls Wartime Hong Kong Days

A friendship originating during the battle at Hong Kong was renewed yesterday between Rev. Father Charles Murphy of Scarborough Foreign Mission Society and Mr. Frank G. O'Neill of this city.

In December, 1941, when the Japanese attacked Hong Kong, Father Murphy was attached to the Maryknoll Mission there. During the battle he combined his priestly duties of padre-at-large for the defenders with his job as a Red Cross driver. The capitulation found him, along with twenty odd brother priests, lashed together for a period of five days without food, while the Japanese debated the idea of dividing the lot of them. Divine Providence intervened and the group were placed into concentration with the British and American civilians.

Father Murphy, who hails from Glouce Bay, N.S., was later elected spokesman for Canadian civilians in the internment camp and it was through his untiring efforts in negotiating with the Japanese that repatriation of all Canadian and a number of British and American civilians, including many sick, resulted in the summer of 1943.

Shortly after the end of the war, Father Murphy returned to the missions in the interior of China, this time to encounter Chinese Communism in the form of teenage boys wielding rifles with bayonets. His replacement on the missions was decided last year when his previous wartime record became known to the Red Chinese and he was recalled to Canada temporarily.

Father Murphy brings to the Island the premiere showing of the motion picture, "On This Rock", a Hollywood technicolor production of the Life of Christ. This magnificent production, now owned by his Order, is a two-hour showing and has received great acclamation.

of the funds might yet be available for distribution to those of us who made our payments." Asked For Details

He stated that the Prince County dealers recently asked the Provincial Department of Agriculture for full details of the amount of levy collected on the 1949 crop, from whom such levy was collected and what disposition was made of the funds.

At the rate of one cent a hundred pounds there should have been about \$54,000 collected, he stated. The statement he received from the Provincial Government accounted for about \$13,000. Of this amount \$5,000 was a loan to the Potato Marketing Board, \$1,800 for the purchase of a tractor with the remainder composed of salaries, advertising and equipment.

He also stated that he had learned that the Marketing Board's potato levy had not been made legal until Dec. 30, 1950 and that the monies collected or levy assessed from Nov. 1 to Dec. 30, 1950 was not legally collectable and hence possibly should not be paid - or if already paid, may be returnable.

"Quite likely," he added, "the levy assessed against dealers for January 1951 is not legal, as it had not been established that the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, a producers' board, has legal right to tax any dealer." He did not question the right of the board to tax the producers.

Distribution of Money Col. Full said he understood a grant of \$1800 of levy money had been made to the Federation of Agriculture, \$5,000 was loaned to the Potato Marketing Board and that a warehouse was bought by the Provincial Government and given to the Central Farmers
