

Horse And Cow Killed By Lightning On Saturday

A horse and cow were killed by lightning on the farm of Miss Margaret Trainor, Birch Hill, when a brief but violent electrical storm hit many parts of Prince County early Saturday evening. The cow was outside the barn when struck and the horse inside. The barn suffered considerable damage. Lightning also struck the farms of Stanley MacLean and Loman MacLean, also in the Birch Hill district, and in the case of the former, a bolt split the flue on the house and caused some damage to the building itself. At the farm of Loman MacLean, lightning struck while the evening milking was in progress, stunning several of the cows momentarily, three or four of them falling down from the shock. One of the cows fell on its milker, Tommy Moore, who also suffered slight shock. It is understood he was not injured. It is felt that lightning arrestors may have prevented more serious damage to the barn and its occupants. —S

Air Operations To Be Based At Summerside

EDMONTON, Alta., 24 June — Two of Canada's most active RCAF Auxiliary units, 19 Wing, Edmonton and 23 Wing, Saskatoon, will provide tactical air support during the last two weeks of July for the large scale army training exercise at Camp Gagetown, N. B. The base of air operations will be Summerside, P.E.I., under the command of Group Captain A. D. R. Lowe, DFC AFC, commandant of 18 Wing headquarters and will serve as the normal summer training camp for western Canadian reserve units of Tactical Air Command. Amalgamating under the one command for the duration of the exercise will be elements of auxiliary and regular force units. The auxiliary units will be 418 'City of Edmonton' and 406 'City of Saskatoon' light bomber squadrons, 4001, 4002 and 4017 Auxiliary Medical units from Edmonton, Saskatoon, and Regina. The medical units will supplement the regular medical services at RCAF Station Summerside. Regular force components will be represented by the Tactical Fighter Flight of Canadian Joint Air Training Centre, Rivers, Manitoba, 408 Photographic Squadron, Rockcliffe, Ontario, and 105 Communications and Rescue Flight, Namao, Alta. Aid and servicing crews of the two light bomber squadrons will fly their Mitchell aircraft to Summerside. The flight will be classed as a long range navigation training exercise. Administrative and maintenance personnel and their equipment will be airlifted by C-119 Flying Boxcars of 435 Transport Squadron, Edmonton. Group Captain Lowe and staff officers visited the Eastern training area recently and report that facilities and provisions for carrying out the summer exercise are of the highest standard and will provide the auxiliary forces with ideal conditions for training.

—NEW TREATMENT REVEALED FOR HYPERTHYROIDISM — TORONTO (CP) — An "atom cocktail" is the latest and most effective treatment for hyperthyroidism. Dr. J. P. Gemmill of Winnipeg told the joint British and Canadian Medical Association convention Thursday.

—The only trouble seems to be that it is too simple, he added. The treatment consists of the patient drinking a glass of "water." The water contains radioactive iodine which goes to the thyroid gland and kills off enough cells to cure the condition. The iodine adds no taste to the water.

—Dr. Gemmill said that of 101 cases he treated in Winnipeg, 81 are now in perfect health, and most of the others in a greatly improved condition. There is slight danger of causing cancer by this treatment, he said. But the symptoms would take 25 or 30 years to show themselves.

—He said the danger of cancer is very small—no more than that from being x-rayed, since the rays can cause a cancer.

Steel Strike In U.S. Probability

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The United Steelworkers (CIO) wage policy committee Monday authorized a country-wide strike but union president David J. McDonald said "don't get the idea we are strike happy."

McDonald called both offers "completely inadequate in a year when the steel industry is making record profits."

At a press conference following the wage policy committee meeting, McDonald said: "I am still optimistic. There is still time for a peaceful wage settlement."

The 170-member committee voted unanimously to give McDonald authority to call a strike in the basic steel industry at midnight Thursday if an agreement is not reached on union demands for a substantial wage increase.

McDonald told newspaper men he expects to resume negotiations with U.S. Steel Corporation, the world's biggest steel producer, today. The company said its negotiations are available for a meeting "at any time."

Kangaroo On Loose In City

BALTIMORE (AP)—A mother kangaroo broke loose from its handlers after a television appearance and went bounding about the city for a full hour Sunday night.

She cleared the hood of an automobile with a beautiful leap. Everywhere she went traffic was disrupted. Children leaned goggle-eyed out of car windows. Women screamed.

After five miles the kangaroo was finally subdued in a piece of undeveloped real estate.

Quaker Factions Are Reunited

NEWMARKET, Ont. (CP)—The three Canadian factions of the Society of Friends were reunited Friday after 127 years' separation. Officially said the reunification of the Orthodox, Conservative and Hicksite divisions of the society ranks as one of the major developments in the 300-year history of the Quaker movement. The reunion marked the climax of the annual meeting at Pakenham College here, attended by Quakers from many parts of Canada and New York state.

The Hicksites broke away from the main body in 1828. In 1861 the movement was again split into Conservative and Orthodox factions.

The Quaker movement was founded by George Fox in England in 1650.

Imperial Oil Fellowships

TORONTO (CP)—Four graduates of Canadian universities have been awarded Imperial Oil fellowships for advanced studies. The awards, valued at \$1,250 a year, may be held for three years.

The winners are Kurt Jonassohn, McGill University, Montreal; John Edward Hogg, University of Toronto; William James King, University of Western Ontario, London; and George Barry Mellon, University of Alberta, Edmonton.

The four men will continue in post-graduate scientific research leading to doctorate degrees. Mr. Jonassohn will study in Chicago, Mr. Hogg at the University of Toronto, Mr. King at McMaster University, Hamilton, and Mr. Mellon at the Pennsylvania State University.

LONDON BLACKED OUT

LONDON (Reuters)—London was virtually blacked out for two hours at mid-day Monday when dark shower clouds panned in a city smog. Lights flashed on in office and store buildings and play was halted at a South Africa-England cricket match here.
