

Dodgers Cop NL Pennant; Drysdale To Open Series

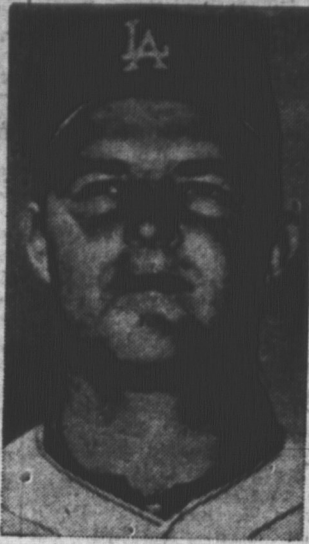

MINNEAPOLIS - ST. PAUL (AP)—Sandy Koufax pitched Los Angeles Dodgers into the World Series Saturday with his sixth victory but Don Drysdale will pitch the opener Wednesday against Minnesota Twins' Jim Grant before 46,000 fans at Metropolitan Stadium.

Because Wednesday is Yom Kippur, the most solemn day on the Jewish calendar, Koufax will respect his religion and remain out of action.

Drysdale, the 23-game winner who has shared the heavy burden with Koufax all season, thus will have a chance to make three starts if the series goes the seven-game route.

The Dodgers' victory over Milwaukee, after San Francisco had beaten Cincinnati 3-2, snuffed out the last chance of the Giants and eliminated any possibility of a National League playoff that would have delayed the start of the series.

The Dodgers and Twins will play the first two games at Minneapolis-St. Paul Wednesday and Thursday. After an open day Friday for travel, they will

resume play at Dodger Stadium Saturday afternoon.

All games will start at 1 p.m. local time and will be carried on radio and television.

DODGERS FAVORED
The Dodgers' eye-catching pitching pair of Koufax and

Drysdale has made the National League champions 13-10 favorites despite the booming power in the bats of Twin sluggers like Harmon Killebrew, Don Mincher, Bob Allison, Jimmie Hall and Tony Oliva.

It was typical of the Dodgers' scrambling style that they beat the Braves for the clincher on only two hits with a walk, stolen base, error and a wild pitch and then got two runs when Brave pitchers walked two with the bases loaded. They were low in the majors in home runs and trailed in most of the power departments with a team average of .245.

For the first time in many a year, key men on both clubs are leadoff hitters who play shortstop. Maury Wills with his bunts, stolen bases and daring base running typifies the Dodger attack. The brilliant Zoilo Versalles of the Twins also is a fine base runner and a brilliant fielder but he has blossomed unexpectedly as a power hitter with 19 home runs.

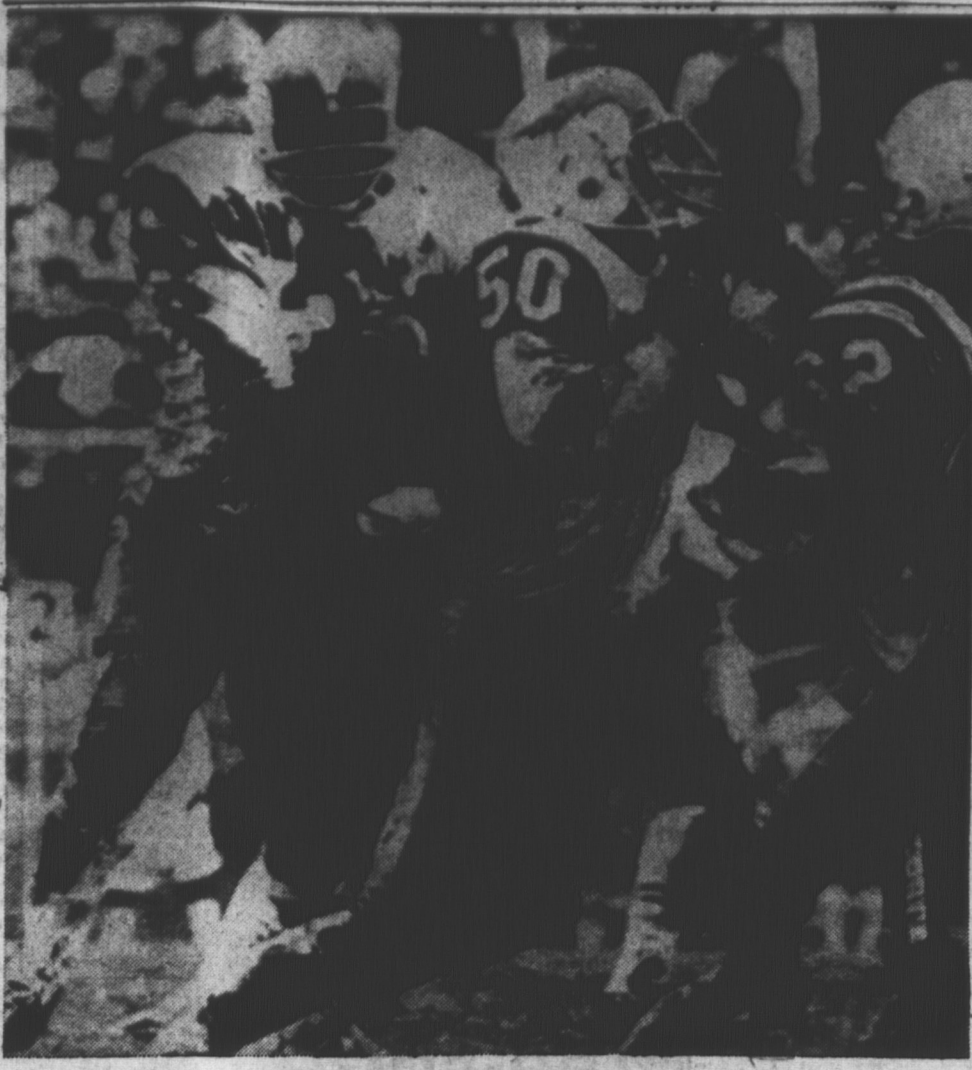
USES PLATOON SYSTEM
Sam Mele, the Twins' manager, expects to confine his pla-

tooning to left field and centre. He will use Sandy Valdespino in left and Hall in centre against right-handers, like Drysdale, and will play Bob Allison in left and Joe Nosssek in centre against lefties like Koufax.

Walter Alston can follow the same "book" without changing personnel because he has four switch-hitters as his regular infield - first baseman Wes Parker, second baseman Jim Lefebvre, shortstop Wills and third baseman Jim Gilliam.

The pitching lineup isn't firm but it probably will be Jim Kaat of the Twins against Koufax in a battle of southpaws in the second game. That would leave it up to Camilo Pascual, the Twins' curve ball artist, against southpaw Claude Osteen in the third game. The same three starters probably will work right back in rotation. If they go to the bullpen, Alston's ace is lefty Ron Peranosti. The Twins' best is right-hander Al Worthington.

We presume, if the Eagles should lose the protest, Dartmouth will have to pay Summerside another visit.

It was hardly softball weather. A very high wind that might have been one of Betsy's kids who had lost its way made it difficult for fielders to judge fly balls, and keeping comfortable in these stands was a difficult chore. Bob Sloan, the official announcer, invited us aboard the sound truck for which we were very grateful.

Two singles and a home run in the first inning gave the Eagles three runs. Doug Allen singled, and then two passed balls, and "Marty Martin's" single brought him home. Gerry Moore's wind-blown home run went over the right fielder's head and accounted for two tallies. Bob Clark's triple in the fourth drove in the other two runs. Dartmouth scored one in the second frame and three in the fourth. Jacques Legendre made two beautiful catches in left field, the first a shoe-string scoop, and the second an "over the shoulder" grab when he and the high wind fought a duel for possession.

Pete Devana chinking for the home team gave up five hits and Ron Goodwin, Dartmouth flinger, who, by the way, won 14 games this season, was touched for nine singles. The play that brought on the protest occurred in the seventh inning. Fraser Betts walked, and was called out for taking a lead off first. At the same time the base judge called "no pitch", but the pitcher threw anyway, and Lahey hit the ball. Betts went to second, and was tagged out giving Lahey, what we spectators thought, was a safety on a fielder's choice. Lahey was sent back to bat, and the Dartmouth management protested, claiming the base judge could not rule "no pitch" after declaring the runner out, and the ball should have continued in play.

When we got home, we rummaged for a softball rule book and turned up two baseball books, one on hockey, and one on how to play scramble, but nothing on softball. Let's suppose, however, the pitch was in order, and Lahey's hitting the ball was also in order. 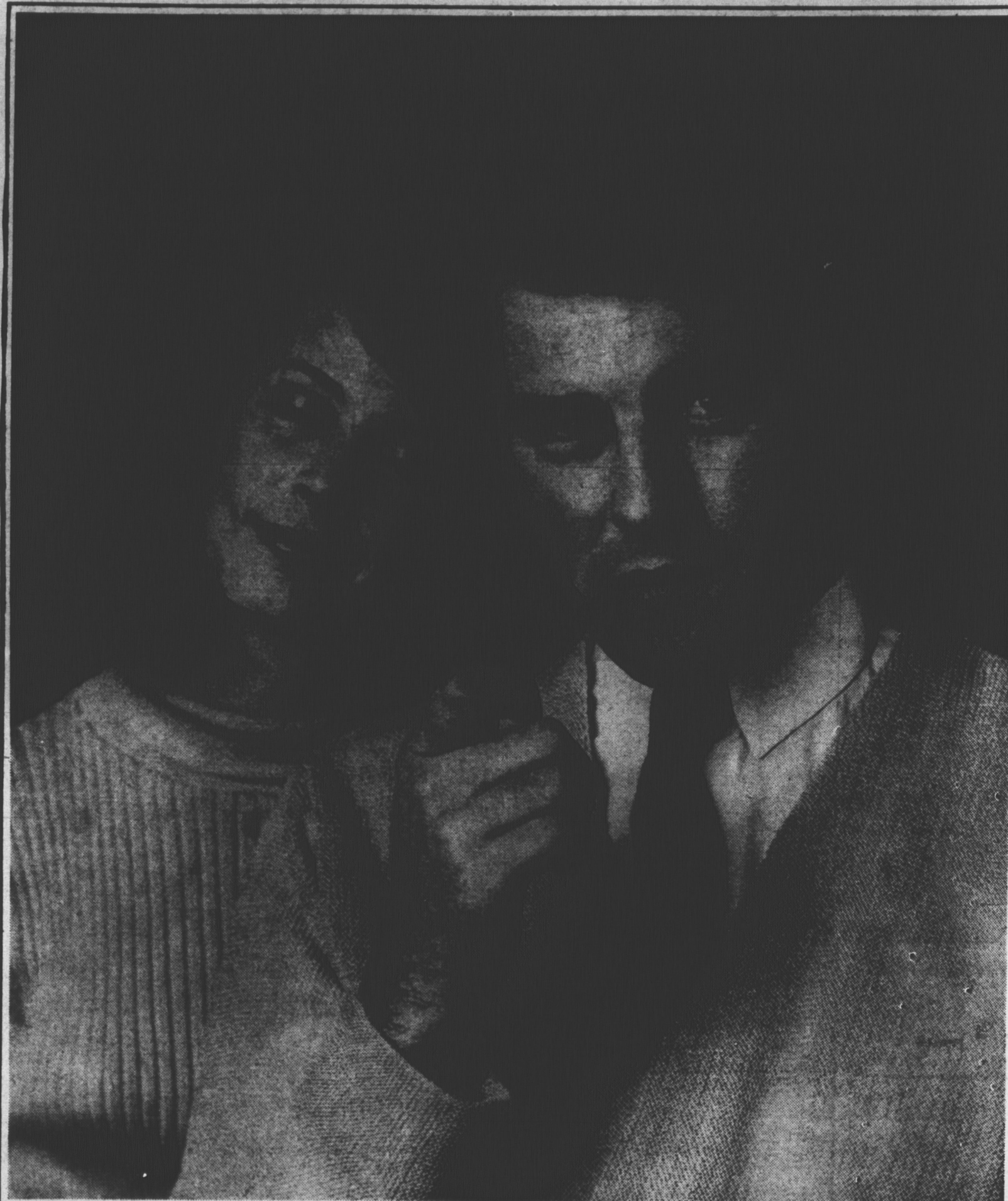
