THE RUSSIAN SITUATION.

The intense interest with which the eyes of all Europe are turned to the sick bed in Livadia, where the Tsar is struggling with the last enemy, is a proof that at length the noble qualities of the man are finding recognition.

It is difficult for those living outside of Russia to understand the anomalous position which she occupies in Europe. She stands to-day from one point of view practically where France stood in regard to the Grand Monarque two centuries ago. Had it been possible for her to surround herself with a wall of exclusion, like China, the problems which confront her ruler to-day might have been averted for a time, but the inevitable contact with the civilization of Europe has brought into existence factors which must be reckoned with.

The overthrow of Napoleon, though due far more to her climate than her arms, raised the prestige of Russia to its highest point and for more than a quarter of a century her influence in the councils of Europe was very great. The Crimean war was her first blow, and the influence of that struggle on the destinies of Russia has been greater than anyone could have imagined at the time.

Lord Derby said, in the course of a recent speech (and he knows) that England on going to Canada "would find themselves in a country very much like their own, where the people are eager in business, well educated, and familiar with all the latest developments in science, living in a community where poverty is practically unknown to those who are not incapacitated either by age or infirmity."
