Heavy Damage When Truck Slides Into Store Window

Ice on the Wood Island hill was the cause of a serious accident at Montague Saturday when a 2-ton truck loaded with heavy lumber slid out of control and crashed into the front of Boehmer's Jewellery Store. The accident occurred shortly after 8 A.M., after a freezing early morning mist had made the pavement slippery and dangerous.

The truck, driven by Mr. George Whiteway of Dover, had proceeded cautiously from Murray River to the top of the hill, where before descending he reduced the gear and applied the brakes. However, the heavily laden truck was soon out of control on the icy pavement, and efforts to make the turn at the bottom were without avail. The truck continued across the main street, leaped over the sidewalk, crashed into the brick corner of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and plunged into the jewellery store owned by C.R. Boehmer.

An occupant of the truck, Mr. Buddy MacKinnon, leaped free just before the initial impact. When the truck hit the bank, the whole load of lumber moved forward, crushing in the cab and pinning Mr. Whiteway behind the wheel. Mr. Pius MacKinnon of the Guardian Office heard the crash and looking out saw flames shooting out from the truck. He immediately called the fire department and the doctor, both of whom answered the call with haste. The fire was quickly extinguished but bars had to be used to pry back the cab to free Mr. Whiteway. He was examined by the doctor and later taken to the Kings County Hospital after which he was taken home.

Damage to Boehmer's Jewellery Store was extensive. One large display window was demolished; together with china on display. A large showcase inside was also broken along with several items enclosed, and many articles adjacent were also broken. The whole front portion of the truck was smashed in, one wheel broken, and the cab crashed in the rear from the force of the moving lumber. Only the quick action of Mr. MacKinnon and the fire department prevented more serious results.

Reports from several early morning travellers all described hazardous travelling conditions. It is reported that the C.N.R. truck from Charlottetown to Montague had great difficulty navigating the treacherous highway. Tea Hill and Bell's Hill were acute danger points, and many motorists experienced the feeling of helplessness as their vehicle began its uncontrolled descent down the hill. Although many cars found a resting place in the ditch, there were no fatal accidents.
